2012-2015 STRATEGIC PLAN

The Superintendent, **Dr. John Deasy**, and the President of the Board of Education, **Mónica García**, recently released a beautiful, colorful, artistically stimulating and above all, politically correct document titled *All Youth Achieving*, 2012-2015 Strategic Plan. The plan literally constitutes a yeoman's amount of work and is impressive, encompassing all of the current trends and buzz words in education and we were duly impressed. However, in all its glory, it does raise a few questions:

- 1. Where did it come from?
- 2. Who wrote it?
- 3. How much did it cost?
- 4. Who endorsed it?
 - a. Where are the rest of the Board Members?
 - b. Where are the unions and employee groups?
 - c. Where are the parent groups?
- 5. Who provided input? Where was the collaboration?
- 6. Although it is posted on the LAUSD website, has anyone really read it?
- 7. How many new initiatives are introduced via the Plan?
- 8. What does it really mean for those in the field?
- 9. Where do all of those happy, smiling people in the pictures really work?

We think this may be another blatant attempt to manipulate the public by dazzling them with a full press of education lingo and pictures of beaming, well-rested, jovial people. Is it another effort to divert attention from the real issues facing the District: tremendous lack of resources, exceedingly low morale, poor working conditions and leadership through fear and intimidation? Or is it the work of those paid "education experts" in the District or outside agencies who have not ever run a school or its supporting units?

We plan to read the Strategic Plan in depth, explore the various initiatives, review the Performance Meter and report to the membership key provisions that will affect working conditions. Prior to seeing the Strategic Plan, AALA asked the Superintendent not to burden school staffs with more new initiatives on top of CCSS, new evaluation procedures, new graduation requirements, new reporting structures and a new discipline policy, all with reduced resources and increased administrative norms. Alas, that apparently fell on deaf ears; so much for "dynamic and distributive leadership" (one of the tenets of establishing a positive collaborative, professional culture).

We encourage AALA members to share their views of Dr. Deasy's "roadmap," based on his "Theory of Change," by sending us a letter via e-mail.

AALA's POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEE (PAC)

AALA members are aware that this is a most challenging political year for public education. To prepare for the work ahead, AALA will soon convene its Political Action Committee (PAC) to begin making decisions about ballot measures to support and political candidates to endorse. Following is information about PACs, in general, and AALA's PAC, in particular.

PAC (Cont.)

What is a PAC? A PAC is a legal vehicle for conducting candidate and ballot measure activity. PACs are governed by State campaign laws and provisions of tax law regarding tax exempt organizations. A PAC is usually part of an overall program to promote an organization's policy goals. AALA's PAC was first organized in 1993.

Who participates in AALA's PAC, and how does it work? AALA's PAC consists of two representative groups, the PAC Steering Committee and the PAC Council. The AALA PAC Steering Committee is currently composed of nine members, including:

- Four members selected by the AALA President, each representing one of the four certificated departments on the Executive Board (adult, elementary, secondary, supervisory)
- Four members representing each of the above four departments respectively who are active participants in the AALA Representative Assembly
- AALA's President

On September 10, 2012, AALA's Executive Board will vote on amending our *PAC Policies and Procedures* to add two classified administrator representatives to the PAC Steering Committee, thus potentially expanding its membership to eleven. The Board will also review AALA's core values in preparation for the PAC to begin its work.

The PAC Steering Committee will meet and select a Chair, Vice-Chair, Treasurer and Secretary. It will invite spokespeople for ballot initiatives and political candidates (or their representatives) to make presentations on why AALA's PAC should support their respective campaigns. The Steering Committee will make recommendations to AALA's PAC Council.

The PAC Council is comprised of AALA's Representative Assembly. Endorsements of ballot measures and candidates must be ratified by a sixty percent (60%) vote of the AALA PAC Council. Voting on endorsements is done without candidates or their representatives present. The Representative Assembly meets four times each year. The first meeting this year will be October 4, 2012.

What campaigns does the AALA PAC get involved in? Historically, AALA's PAC has supported initiatives that support public education and candidates who understand, advocate for and successfully implement ideas and programs beneficial to our members. Above all, our PAC has taken an active interest in ballot measures on funding for public education and LAUSD School Board elections. For example, in the last School Board election, AALA supported Board candidates, **Bennett Kayser** and **Dr. Richard Vladovic**. We donated \$10,000 toward the LAUSD parcel tax measure in 2010 and raised an additional \$15,000 for the campaign. We donated funds to and actively supported such school bond campaigns as Measure Q (2008), Measure Y (2005) and Measure K (2002). We have also involved ourselves in the campaigns of various political candidates who support public education and recognize the essential role administrators play in schools and the District.

What campaigns will happen this year?

- Proposition 30 (the Governor's initiative) and Proposition 38 (**Molly Munger's** initiative) are on the November 2012 ballot.
- Three school board seats are up for election in March 2013, as well as mayoral and City Council positions.

HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ

Topic: Remember to Use Your Flexible Spending Account

What is a FSA?

Flexible spending accounts (FSA) allow current employees to pay for certain eligible health care and dependent care expenses using tax-free earnings. If you selected an FSA during open enrollment last year, you set aside an annual amount (up to \$5,000) to be deducted from your salary for out-of-pocket health care and/or dependent care expenses during 2012. The District offers two special tax-savings accounts to eligible employees—a Health Care FSA and a Dependent Day Care FSA. Retirees, because they are not employees, are not eligible for an FSA.

Health Care FSA

This FSA covers out-of-pocket costs, including deductibles, copayments, coinsurance, prescription drugs, orthodontia or other planned dental treatments, as well as, LASIK, prescription eyewear, contact lenses and medically prescribed devices.

Not covered are over-the-counter medications, maternity clothes, fees or dues for exercise clubs or classes, premiums for long-term care, cosmetic surgery (unless directly related to a mastectomy) and products such as exercise equipment, whirlpools and saunas. Under guidelines that became effective on January 1, 2011, the cost of over-the-counter medicines or drugs cannot be reimbursed from an FSA account without a prescription.

Dependent Day Care FSA

This FSA provides coverage for dependent day care for children under age 13 or dependents, regardless of age, who are physically or mentally disabled. Eligible expenses include child or adult day care services provided in your home, including Social Security taxes paid on behalf of your employee, child or adult day care services provided at someone else's home, expenses for a licensed day care center, a portion of wages for a housekeeper whose duties include caring for a qualified dependent and schooling costs for children not yet in kindergarten (if it cannot be separated from the cost of care).

Ineligible expenses include babysitting charges for nonwork hours, fees paid to your dependent child under age 19, fees paid to someone who doesn't report income to the IRS, kindergarten or overnight camp and charges incurred if your spouse is not working, not going to school full time for at least five months, or is not disabled.

This is my first FSA. How do I file for reimbursement?

You may file a claim after services and/or payment(s) for covered expenses are incurred. Access claim forms online at the Benefit Administration's home page: http://benefits.lausd.net. Locate "Forms and Publications" at the top right of the screen, click on the type of FSA you have and then *FSA Claim Form*. Send your claim to: UniAccount, P.O. Box 4381, Woodland Hills, CA 91365, or fax it to 818. 234.4730. Your FSA plan will issue you a check once a month or when your expenses reach \$50.
