## BARGAINING BULLETIN: INSTRUCTIONAL SPECIALISTS' AND APs' CONCERNS, CONTINUED

The District's *General Fund School Program Manual*, issued by the Budget Services and Financial Planning Division on March 27, 2013, is used by schools to craft their site budgets based on per pupil funding. Page 4 of the Manual cites the following guidelines which were not previously communicated to generic assistant principals or instructional specialists:

#4 AP, Secondary, Generic positions may be budgeted but not required.

#5 Temporary Advisers, Instructional Specialists, will have their pay reduced one level on the Master Salary Schedule next year, as follows:

High School	Level 40 to 39
Middle School	Level 39 to 38
Elementary School	Level 37 to 36

AALA has repeatedly requested that District senior leadership, including **Michelle King**, Senior Deputy Superintendent of School Operations, share information with AALA that affects our members. However, the District failed to provide us copies of the *General Fund School Program Manual*. After AALA members informed us of the Instructional Specialists' pay cut, we reminded Ms. King that AALA represents both generic APs and Instructional Specialists, and the District not only neglected to inform us of the salary reduction in question, but implemented it without negotiations. Ms. King indicated that this was done to preserve generic AP positions.

While it is essential that the District increase the number of generic APs, this action will have the opposite effect and, in fact, will reduce the number of generic APs at schools. Decreasing the number of generic APs will have a negative impact on school safety, supervision and the implementation of numerous mandated District initiatives. It is also a great injustice to Instructional Specialists who, in most cases, have done essentially the same job as generic APs. Further, it will dramatically increase the already excessive workload of the remaining site administrators.

On April 19, 2013, AALA President **Dr. Judith Perez** sent a letter to **Superintendent John Deasy** pointing out that any unilateral change in the Master Salary Table is a clear violation of AALA's rights; salary is a mandatory subject of collective bargaining. On May 7, Dr. Perez received a phone call from the Superintendent about this matter. During that conversation, she and **Dan Isaacs**, AALA Administrator, offered a viable solution to resolve the District's unilateral action. As of May 16, the matter remains unresolved. However, the District finally agreed to specific dates for negotiations on this and other matters, starting the week of May 20. We will continue to keep you informed of progress via *Update*.

## A CITY AGENDA FOR L.A. SCHOOLS

For those who need reminding, I'll state it clearly: Neither the Los Angeles mayor nor the City Council has one lick of voting authority at the Los Angeles Unified School District. They can't set policy at the district, nor can they hire or fire its leaders. And when **Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa** tried to challenge that organizational structure, launching an unconstitutional attempt to take over the entire school district, the courts quickly slapped him down.

But those facts haven't seemed to stop candidates for city office from grandstanding about district schools, turning them into a political piñata as they attempt to score points with voters. Bashing the district seems to be the default response when a candidate is asked a tough question about the city. Instead, we need elected leaders who are willing to pitch in and help.

L.A.'s school district faces huge challenges. More than three-quarters of its students live in poverty; about 29% haven't mastered English and an additional 13% are in special education classes. But despite that, even as class sizes have continued to rise and the budget has been slashed, students continue to make academic gains. Part of that is due to sacrifices by district staff. District employees again took pay cuts this year so that children would continue to have after-school programs, art in elementary schools, early education opportunities, Academic Decathlon teams and an All-City marching band. And yes, California just dropped to 49th in the nation in student funding.

Against this backdrop, there is an important role for elected officials to play, and it is one that goes far beyond politically motivated carping. A recent study noted that the average student spends just 18% of his or her life in school. The great bulk of a student's time is spent at home or out in the community. I'd love to hear the mayoral candidates commit to partnering with the district to create a better city for children.

If public officials in the more than two dozen cities served by L.A. Unified want to do something to help kids succeed, there are plenty of things within their purview: making communities safer, for example, or more economically vibrant and family friendly. Rather than looking east to cities where mayors have made power grabs to take over schools, they should look north to San Francisco, which stands as a model of how a city-school district partnership can work.

In Los Angeles a few years ago, the Department of Water and Power agreed to refund more than \$100 million it had overcharged L.A. Unified and other public institutions. In San Francisco, public schools get deeply discounted electricity from the local utility under an agreement forged decades ago. While L.A.'s Metropolitan Transportation Authority recently shaved a small amount off the monthly bill of students traveling to schools on public transit, San Francisco recently instituted a program that allows low- and moderate-income students to ride for free. Many San Francisco museums are also free to students. And school policing costs come, for the most part, out of the San Francisco police budget, not the school district's. Furthermore, the city provides substantial funding to a variety of school programs, pursuant to an initiative approved by San Francisco voters, including for preschools, arts and student-support services.

If the mayoral candidates want more ideas for how they can lead on education, they might consider what **Gavin Newsom** did during his first run for mayor of San Francisco. He took the politically risky move of supporting additional city funding for schools. The measure he supported passed, and it has spared San Francisco schools from some of the worst ravages of state budget cuts.

L.A. Unified students need safe routes to schools, access to healthy food, open playgrounds and libraries, support for after-school programs, free public transportation to school, real access to museums, Internet in the home, summer jobs, violence-free communities, regular healthcare, clean air and water, safe homes, employed parents and a vibrant parks and recreation program that supports healthy living. Doesn't that sound like a perfect education agenda for the mayor and the City Council?

**HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ**

***TOPIC: COBRA, CAL-COBRA AND AB528 COVERAGE WHEN NO LONGER ELIGIBLE FOR DISTRICT-PAID BENEFITS***

**What is COBRA?**

COBRA stands for the Consolidated Omnibus Reconciliation Act (1985), a federal law. Under COBRA, former employees, retirees, spouses, former spouses and dependent children may temporarily continue their health coverage at their own expense for at least 18 months and up to 36 months. Domestic partners are not covered under COBRA but may qualify for CAL-COBRA, a California law like COBRA.

**How does COBRA work?**

To continue coverage under COBRA, you must notify the District within 60 days after the loss of eligibility. The District's COBRA Administrator, FBMC, will send the appropriate COBRA election/enrollment packet. COBRA participants must pay monthly premiums which cannot be more than 102% of the District's premiums paid for active employees and/or dependents. COBRA premiums for 2013 are available on the District website at <http://benefits.lausd.net/cobra-rates>. Note that the premium rate is not the same amount shown on an employee's salary warrant.

**How long does COBRA continue coverage?**

Generally, COBRA continues coverage for at least 18 months and up to 36 months, depending on the qualifying event or the reason for losing health coverage. Separated employees, for example, have an 18-month limit, while dependents have 36 months. A beneficiary with a disability may qualify for 11 additional months for a total of 29 months of COBRA coverage. When the 18-month federal COBRA period ends, beneficiaries may apply for Cal-COBRA or AB528 coverage.

**How do Cal-COBRA and AB528 continue COBRA coverage?**

Both continue health coverage when federal COBRA coverage ends so that participants may have continued coverage for a maximum of 36 months.

Cal-COBRA is California's law with similar provisions to federal COBRA. AB528 is exclusively for surviving spouses of retirees. Once COBRA eligibility for the surviving spouse ends, s/he may be able to continue coverage through a special District program, AB528, which extends COBRA coverage for another 18 months.

**What are the benefits of coverage under Federal COBRA, Cal-COBRA and AB528?**

- You have the same benefits as District employees or retirees in the same plan.
- You can participate in the annual Open Enrollment period to change plans.
- You have no restrictions due to preexisting conditions.

## BUDGET NEWS

Governor Brown released his proposed budget on Tuesday, May 14, 2013, and it included good news for education. This current proposal contains an additional \$1.6 billion more for schools than was projected in January. While the Governor says that the state's financial condition "remains treacherously unstable" he is giving public education a sizable boost, although still not enough to make up for the decrease in funding that occurred over the past six years. In fact, when compared to noneducation state programs (legislative, judicial, executive, business, consumer, housing, transportation, health, et. al.), education was the only one that sustained an overall decrease from 2007-08 to 2013-14, as a result of a 3% cut to K-12 funding. When comparing to all levels of education during the same time period, community college and UC funding increased, albeit minimally. Funding for noneducation programs increased by 27.9% since 2007-08, resulting in education's share of the state budget declining by 6.4 percentage points.

Two highlights of the budget included \$1 billion for the common core implementation (includes training and curricular materials) and \$240 million toward the Governor's controversial local control formula funding. In addition, the proposed budget retains the control of the adult school programs within the K-12 system. AALA analyst, **David Tokofsky**, questioned Board Members (at the meeting on May 14), given the Governor's additional money, Propositions 30 and 32 and the increased state revenue, why was the District proposing cuts to Instructional Specialists' salaries, adult school and early education programs, ROP/ROC, 9<sup>th</sup> grade class size reduction, art and music? We will keep you posted.
