## A NEW YEAR, A BETTER BUDGET: DARE WE HOPE FOR BETTER TIMES?

Following years of devastating cuts to programs, resources and personnel, the 2014-15 LAUSD budget actually shows some improvements and investments in the students who need them most. After adopting the budget on Tuesday, June 24, 2014, Superintendent **John Deasy** released a statement saying, “We passed a historic opportunity and set of investments to ensure all of our students graduate college-prepared and career-ready, by allocating our resources in an equitable manner. These investments will help us serve all of our students, especially those with the highest need and I could not be prouder of our leadership and commitment to the youth of LAUSD.” The press release says that the budget does three things:

1. Serves the youth identified as the highest need.
2. Invests in LAUSD employees.
3. Proposes a balanced three-year trajectory aligned with the Local Control Accountability Plan.

The budget will add more than 1,200 teachers, increase the number of librarians, nurses and counselors, reduce class sizes and provide more resources and supplemental services for English Learners, foster, homeless and low-income children. And while Dr. Deasy has said that he supports wage increases, there were no specific provisions in the budget that addressed salary adjustments for employees. Much time and space in the *Update* has been allocated to the needs of AALA members and other LAUSD employees and the unions have stood together in their requests for restoration of positions and wages. Negotiations are in progress for both of AALA’s units, certificated and classified. We are hopeful that we will reach agreement soon on compensation, working conditions and related issues.

At a point when we thought morale could go no lower, administrators have been faced with an incredible workload, new programs and initiatives and students who are dealing with the impact of a huge income gap that has left many in depressed circumstances. We hope that during this upcoming school year, administrators will not have to be faced with carrying out yet another plethora of new initiatives, especially while being burdened with the mandated, yet not ready for implementation, MiSiS. In the best of all worlds, we would like to spend time on refining and improving the ones we’ve already begun—CCSS, iPad use, TGDC, SLGDP, LCAP, Master Plan, the new discipline plan, restorative justice, attendance improvement, etc. That would really be an investment in employees—give them time and resources to do their jobs.

The intent of the LCFF is to address the needs of students who are most needy. Practically all of LAUSD falls into that category, but the money must be distributed according to an index that has been developed.

And, as with any budget, all needs cannot be met. However, we hope that by focusing resources on identified students in specific schools, some of the inherent harms of income inequality can be mitigated. As educators, we believe in the sense of community, the strength of public service, that education is truly the building block of society and that compensation should reflect the depth of the work. With the start of the new school year, we look forward with hope for better days, higher morale, appreciation and recognition for the work we do and improved circumstances for our school communities.

## THE CHANGING DEMOGRAPHIC OF SCHOOL SEGREGATION

A report released by the Civil Rights Project at UCLA assessed the nation's progress in addressing school segregation sixty years after the landmark case *Brown v. Board of Education*. The report, Brown at 60: Great Progress, a Long Retreat and an Uncertain Future, found that changing demographics has resulted in an almost 30% drop in white students and a quintupling of Latino students nationwide. It shows that the south and west portions of the nation have a majority of what have traditionally been called minority students.

Brown at 60 points out that Latinos, the fastest-growing ethnic group in the United States, are now the most segregated students in public schools, especially in large suburban communities. It stresses that this school segregation reflects not only racial and ethnic separation but isolation by family income. "Over half of the schools that have more than 90 percent black or Latino students are also schools where half or more of students are living at or below the poverty line," said **Dr. Erica Frankenberg**, a co-author of the study. Among the key findings of the research are:

- *Black and Latino students are an increasingly large percentage of suburban enrollment, particularly in larger metropolitan areas, and are moving to schools with relatively few white students.*
- *Segregation for blacks is the highest in the Northeast, a region with extremely high district fragmentation.*
- *Latinos are now significantly more segregated than blacks in suburban America.*
- *Black and Latino students tend to be in schools with a substantial majority of poor children, while white and Asian students typically attend middle class schools.*
- *Segregation is by far the most serious in the central cities of the largest metropolitan areas; the states of New York, Illinois and California are the top three worst for isolating black students.*
- *California is the state in which Latino students are most segregated.*

The codirector of the Civil Rights Project, **Dr. Gary Orfield**, says that there has been no real effort to desegregate Latinos because most of the court orders were related to black and white racial balance and never applied to Latino students. However, as California is now home to one-quarter of the nation's immigrants and is projected to have a Latino majority this year, it must significantly improve educational outcomes for these children in order to stay economically competitive. The state educates more than one-third of the English Learners in the nation, yet their academic achievement lags behind other groups. **Governor Brown's** Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) is forcing districts to focus on the needs of English Learners and other students most in need, which will, hopefully, increase the number of adults in the state with high school diplomas (California is currently 46<sup>th</sup> in the nation) and ensure the state's future workforce competitiveness.

## HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ

### **TOPIC: NO LONGER ELIGIBLE FOR DISTRICT-PAID BENEFITS? WHAT OPTIONS ARE AVAILABLE?**

#### **What happens when a member or dependent loses his or her eligibility for District-paid benefits?**

With the recent enactment of the state health exchanges, former employees, retirees, spouses, former spouses and dependent children have two options:

- **Enroll in COBRA.** COBRA continues their health coverage at their own expense for at least 18 months under COBRA, CAL-COBRA or AB528 (for surviving spouses). COBRA stands for the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (1985). This federal law requires employers to offer continued coverage under the employer's plan even after termination, layoff or other change in employment status.
- **Enroll through Covered California,** the state's health exchange. If individuals are newly uninsured, they will qualify for special enrollment in Covered California (<http://www.coveredca.com>) and must select a plan within 60 days after losing District-paid coverage.

#### **What factors should individuals consider when deciding on either COBRA or Covered California?**

- What selection/choice of doctors and hospitals are available in each plan?
- How much are the monthly premiums for you and your dependents?
- What are the copays and deductibles in the various plans?
- How much will prescription drugs cost?

#### **Are there any advantages or disadvantages to being insured through COBRA or Covered California?**

##### *Advantages:*

- Under COBRA coverage, individuals have the same benefits as District employees or retirees in the same plan and can participate in the annual Open Enrollment period to change plans.
- Covered California offers federal assistance subsidies for low-income individuals.

##### *Disadvantages:*

- COBRA monthly premiums may be higher.
- Covered California plans may have higher copays and deductibles for equivalent coverage. Prescription drug costs may be significantly higher.

#### **I currently have COBRA coverage and found a suitable plan on the Covered California Exchange. Can I make a change right now?**

If you are currently enrolled in COBRA coverage, you can enroll in an insurance plan offered by Covered California through July 15, 2014. Once you enroll, however, you can't reverse your decision and go back to COBRA, unless you have another qualifying event for making midyear changes. After July 15, 2014, you can only enroll in a Covered California plan during Open Enrollment in the fall of 2014.

## CALSTRS UPDATE

As a result of the 2014-15 California State Budget that was signed on June 15, 2014, all CalSTRS active members will see an increase in their contributions as of July 1, 2014. The increase will be mild this year, going from 8 percent to 8.15 percent. The contribution rate will increase to 10.25 percent over the next three years. Employer (district) contributions will increase from the current 8.25 percent to 19.1 percent in 2021. “With a responsible funding plan firmly in place, CalSTRS members can be assured their future benefits will be there when they need them,” says CEO **Jack Ehnes**.

## PENDING LEGISLATION

AB 2127 (**Ken Cooley**, D-Rancho Cordova) has been approved by the State Legislature and sent to **Governor Brown** for his signature. The bill prohibits middle and high school football teams from holding full-contact practices during the off-season and restricts them to two practices per week during the season. In an effort to reduce the risk of concussions, the bill also limits the full-contact practices to 90 minutes on any given day. This follows similar moves by the Ivy League and the Pac-12 Conferences, Pop Warner and the NFL.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that nearly 4 million high school students suffer head injuries every year. In addition, a study published last summer in the *Annals of Biomedical Engineering* found that high school football players were more exposed to high-level head impacts and at more risk of concussion during practice than actual games.

AB 2127 is supported by the American Academy of Neurology, the Brain Injury Association of California and the California Interscholastic Federation. However, five Republicans voted against the bill. Senator **Steve Knight** (Palmdale) said that it reduces coaches’ ability to prepare players for games and that it could also mean fewer students getting college scholarships.

## **LAUSD BOARD OF EDUCATION SHOULD BE EMBARRASSED: DISTRICT PRINCIPAL SALARIES ARE THE LOWEST IN THE STATE**

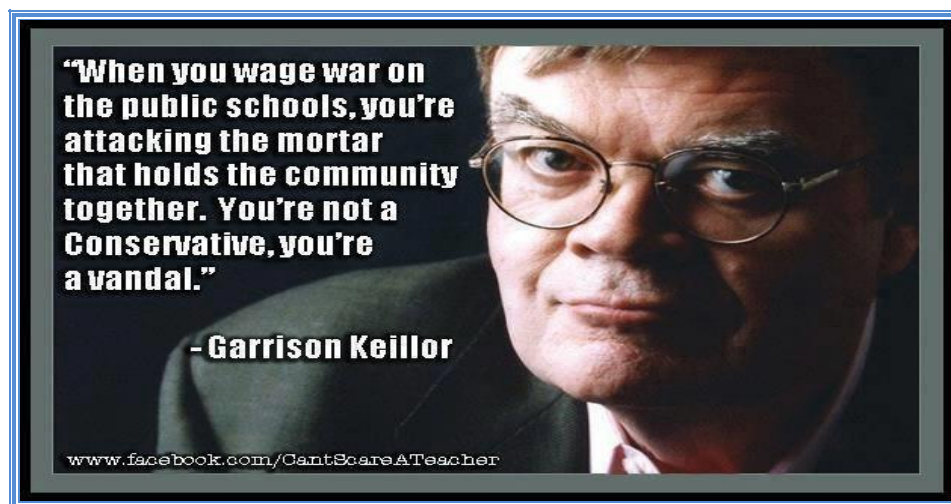
*ALA thanks the secondary principal who wishes to remain anonymous for providing this information.*

I have developed a very bad habit of reading the job postings in the ACSA *EdCal* newspaper. This only serves to aggravate me and if I thought my morale could go no lower, I prove myself wrong each time I look at the salaries. Do the members of the LAUSD Board of Education know that their principals are among the lowest paid in the state? Why is it that each school year, dozens of districts across the state post elementary school principal salaries that are significantly higher than the top salary of \$119,381 for high school principals in LAUSD? Why do other school districts value their school-site administrators more than the LAUSD?

All LAUSD administrators—instructional specialists, assistant principals, principals, instructional directors, etc.—are taken for granted by the School Board. I guess the Board can continue to pay us less, while piling on the daily responsibilities because it knows that we will come to work each day and give 100% effort on behalf of our students, teachers and support staff.

Below are examples of salaries taken from recent *EdCal* newspapers that are significantly higher than those in the LAUSD.

- Cupertino Union School District Elementary School Principal—\$ 128,211; Assistant Principal—\$123,382
- Beverly Hills Unified School District Elementary School Principal—\$ 123,162 (212 days)
- San Rafael City Schools Elementary School Principal—\$ 118,875 (210 days); High School Assistant Principal—\$ 130,358
- Goleta Union School District Elementary School Principal—\$ 121,520
- Fullerton Joint Union High School District Assistant Principal—\$ 128,583 (220 days)

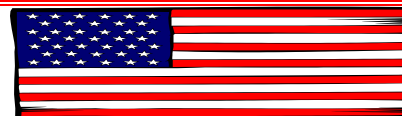
