BARGAINING BULLETIN: AGREEMENT REACHED FOR AALA CLASSIFIED UNIT

On July 10, 2014, Unit J’s bargaining team reached tentative agreement with the District on the classified re-openers for 2014-2015. AALA’s classified members will have the opportunity to ratify the agreement online, July 24-29, 2014, and it will go to the Board of Education for approval in August. You may access the full agreement [HERE](#) or through the AALA website. The summary below explains the major provisions of the agreement. As has been mentioned before, we appreciate the District’s bargaining team for its professionalism and timely communication.

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AALA CLASSIFIED MANAGERS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING 2014-2015 A SUMMARY

1. **Compensation** (2% one-time bonus + 6.5% raise over three years; identical with the raise negotiated by AALA’s certificated bargaining team)

2013-2014	2% off-schedule, lump-sum salary payment, on a one-time basis (date TBD)
2014-2015	2% on-schedule wage increase
2015-2016	2% on-schedule wage increase*
2016-2017	2.5% on-schedule wage increase*

*Contingency: increased District revenues or decreased operating expenses

If the Board of Education approves a higher general percentage increase on the base salary table for another group of employees for any of the years covered by the agreement, AALA will receive comparable treatment.

2. **Evaluation**

2014-2015	AALA Unit J and the District agree to a pilot of the Classified Growth and Development Cycle evaluation. Procedures will be negotiated through a side letter.
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MOU (Cont.)

3. Payroll Optimization

July 1, 2016 A semi-monthly pay system will be implemented.

4. Hours of Work (Article IX)

- a. Section 2.1: A change in contract language requiring the District to give employees at least ten (10) business days' notice, when practicable, if their work week, daily hours of work and/or work shift is to be changed permanently.
- b. Section 2.2: A change in contract language allowing flexible reduced hours to be taken in up to two (2) subsequent pay periods if work demands involve significant extended hours of work within a given pay period.
- c. Section 2.2: Emergency call responses are to be subject to the provisions of this section (members may earn flex time when they respond to emergency calls outside their regular hours).

5. Vacation (Article XVII)

The annual vacation calendar for the following year will be issued by March 15; employees will select vacation time by April 15.

6. Tuition Reimbursement (Article XIX)

Section 1.0 b: Tuition reimbursements will be increased from \$700 to \$1,000 per 12-month period.

While AALA's classified bargaining team did not get everything we tried to get for members, we were pleased with our team's toughness and diplomacy. For example, if another bargaining unit gets a higher percentage salary increase, AALA members will also receive it. Later this school year, Unit J's bargaining team will begin negotiations on our Successor Agreement. A collective bargaining agreement is always a work in progress, and the Unit J team is committed to continue working hard to improve members' compensation package and working conditions.

AALA CONTRACT RATIFICATION PROCESS

Active AALA members must vote to ratify their tentative contract agreements negotiated by AALA's certificated and classified bargaining teams:

- Certificated members will vote on a three-year (2014-2017) successor agreement, with provisions for salary and contract reopeners each year.
- Classified Unit J members will vote on a 2014-2015 reopener agreement that includes a three-year compensation package. Negotiations for a three-year successor agreement begin in 2015.

HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ

TOPIC: KEEP A FIRST-AID KIT HANDY AT HOME AND IN YOUR CAR

A well-stocked first-aid kit prepares you to treat minor injuries/emergencies. Keep one at your workplace, home and even in your car. Be prepared by learning how to treat minor injuries and wounds. Learn the warning signs for when to call 911. Take a course or refresher course on first aid and CPR.

What minor injuries or accidents should I be prepared to treat?

Common accidents in or around the home typically include: burns, cuts, abrasions (scrapes), splinters, sprains, insect bites and strains.

What items should be in a first-aid kit?

You can purchase ready-made first-aid kits or put one together yourself. The Red Cross recommends a basic kit that includes the following:

- Bandages, assorted sizes
- Absorbent compress dressings
- Adhesive cloth tape
- Sterile gauze rolls, varying sizes
- Sterile gauze pads
- Butterfly bandages
- Antiseptic wipes
- Antibiotic ointment
- Your medical information, including doctors and nearest medical facilities
- Scissors
- Tweezers
- Instant cold compress
- Oral thermometer
- Nonlatex gloves
- Painkiller tablets
- Space blanket
- CPR breathing barrier
- First-aid instruction booklet/chart

Where's the best place to store a kit at home?

The kitchen, out of reach of small children, is the best place to store your first-aid kit. The bathroom may become too humid, which lessens the shelf life of certain products. Make sure everyone in your family knows where it's kept.

What items should a travel kit contain?

Take some of the same basic items, but add painkillers, antidiarrhea tablets and cold/cough capsules. Other items might include water purification tablets, an anti-itch cream like Calamine Lotion and other items, depending on where you are going.

REFUGEES, NOT IMMIGRANTS

Close to 50,000 unaccompanied minors have been apprehended trying to enter into the United States so far this year; 18,000 more than during all of 2013. Thousands more are pouring into Mexico, Costa Rica and Nicaragua. Nearly 75 percent are from Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala, all of which are in the top five countries with the highest murder rates in the world. Stories about this surge of immigrant children have been featured in headlines throughout the country and television has captured both the compassionate and vitriolic responses to their plight. One might ask, "Why are these children leaving their countries and why are so many desperate to get to the U.S.?" The reason they come to our country is fairly simple: A 2008 law requires the United States to provide full immigration hearings to any unaccompanied children who reach the U.S. from countries other than Mexico and Canada, and the same law requires them to be placed in "the least restricted setting possible" as they await the outcome of their hearings, which can take years. As a result, many are released to relatives or guardians and disappear into the fabric of society.

The reasons why they leave Central America are more complex. Why are a growing number of children traveling thousands of miles and braving hunger, dehydration, robbery, extortion, sexual abuse, kidnapping and murder to reach the United States? Some of the older children leave to escape the abject poverty of their homes. They come to America looking for work. Others wish to reunite with relatives already here, but the major reasons parents are sending their children away is the fear of gang violence that reaches into almost every corner of El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras. Some parents reportedly pay smugglers more than \$8,000 to send their children to the U.S. to get away from the grinding poverty and gang violence that plague their countries.

Many argue that the immigration of these children is a humanitarian issue that needs to be treated differently than with the standard immigration procedures. They say the children should be seen as refugees, not voluntary migrants. Forget about the pursuit of the American dream, an American education or an American job. They are simply trying to stay alive. In fact, a document from the Department of Homeland Security that was obtained by the Pew Research Center confirmed this by stating, "...many Guatemalan children come from rural areas, indicating they are probably seeking economic opportunities in the U.S. Salvadoran and Honduran children, on the other hand, come from extremely violent regions where they probably perceive the risk of traveling alone to the U.S. preferable to remaining at home."

More than half of the top 50 Central American cities from which children are leaving for the United States are in Honduras. The three top municipalities sending children to the U.S. are all in Honduras. San Pedro Sula, a city in Honduras, is the world's murder capital, with the country having the highest homicide rate in the world as well, about 90 per 100,000 inhabitants. El Salvador is not far behind with 70 per 100,000. By contrast, the rate in the gun-obsessed U.S. is under five per 100,000.

According to a 2012 report by InSight Crime, a research organization that specializes in studying organized crime in Latin America and the Caribbean, El Salvador and Honduras have some of the most sophisticated criminal organizations in Central America. These transnational criminal gangs, such as Mara Salvatrucha and Calle 18 (both born and grown in Los Angeles), actively recruit or kidnap new members to join their ranks from among middle and high school students, many of whom must drop out of school to tend to younger siblings as parents toil the farms to put food on the table. Gang members

know this. They force children to join and often kidnap the younger ones and use them to carry drugs or sell them to smugglers. Those who object are raped, tortured and often killed.

Leslie Velez, senior protection officer for the U.N. High Commission on Refugees, recently reported that, of 404 immigrant children from Mexico and Central America who were interviewed, almost 60 percent of them were fleeing violence. She concluded, "We liken the situation very much to...the recruitment of child soldiers on other continents. Children are particularly vulnerable, they are susceptible to harm, they are easily terrorized...They are specifically being target[ed] to be recruited..." For these and other reasons, many of the children are potentially eligible for relief from deportation; they may have valid asylum claims or qualify for special visas for children who are abandoned or are victims of human trafficking.

The current instability can be tracked to the recent drug wars in Latin America. Drug cartels filled the vacuum of governance created by suppressed democracy and arrested economic development. Members of the crime syndicates now rule the streets in these countries, rob, kidnap, extort money and carry out threats of murder against young people and their families if they don't cooperate. Drug-fueled corruption, political instability and, in the case of Honduras, a rightwing coup, have all contributed to a situation of institutional collapse. As their states fall apart around them, many Central Americans feel that justice and security can only be found elsewhere.

While many view this situation as a humanitarian issue, others are playing political football with it and blaming the president for failed immigration policies and enforcement. Daily mass deportations of these children are occurring, and **President Obama** has asked Congress for more resources to secure the border, hasten deportations and help Central American nations address security problems. As he tries a balancing act of being tough on border issues and sympathetic to immigration reform, he should realize that these children are risking their lives to come here. They are *fleeing* real threats of violence and death at home and playing politics with their fate is inexcusable. As **Hector Villagra**, Executive Director of the ACLU, wrote in the *Los Angeles Times*, "How we as a nation treat these refugee children fleeing for their lives will speak volumes about what we truly value. More than compassion or pity, what these kids need is for Congress and the president to exhibit the characteristic that unites us as Americans: a fundamental sense of fairness and due process."

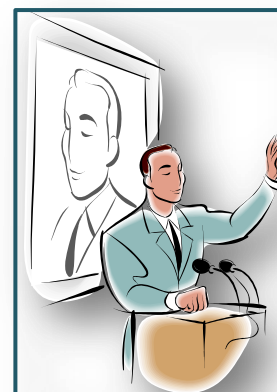

- CalPERS recently announced an 18.9 percent return on invests for the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2013, resulting in the pension fund having assets of more than \$300 billion. This is the fourth double-digit return in the last five years and is more than twice the 7.5 percent return that is required to meet current and future obligations. Fitch Ratings, a leading global rating agency, gave CalPERS its AAA rating for the System's funding of retirement benefits, financial condition and available liquidity. As of the latest actuarial valuation (June 30, 2013), CalPERS' pension plan was 83.1% funded. **Henry Jones**, former Chief Financial Officer of LAUSD, is the Chair of CalPERS Investment Committee.
