## LAUSD AND UTLA REACH A TENTATIVE AGREEMENT

The Los Angeles Unified School District and United Teachers Los Angeles reached a tentative agreement in contract negotiations on Friday, April 17, 2015. The agreement must be approved by both the LAUSD Board of Education and the UTLA membership. The parties agreed on a three-year, \$607 million dollar contract that includes a multitiered evaluation system, summer school, reduced class sizes in 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grade English/Language Arts and mathematics classes, increased counseling services and a multiyear salary structure. The agreement was reached after seven months of sometimes contentious negotiations and a declaration of impasse, initiated by UTLA, which led to mediation and a successful agreement. Both sides expressed pleasure that an agreement had been reached.

A 10.36 percent salary increase covering several years is part of the agreement. Details may be found in the second bullet below.

According to the District's press release, the following are the key components of the agreement:

- *A 3-year agreement covering 2014-2017 with limited reopeners in 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 which includes a salary reopener.*
- *A 4% on-schedule salary increase effective July 1, 2014; a 2% on-schedule salary increase effective January 1, 2015; a 2% on-schedule salary increase effective July 1, 2015, and a 2% on-schedule salary increase effective January 1, 2016.*
- *A 3-level final evaluation system, which will allow for additional flexibilities through the CORE Waiver. Additionally, a joint committee will be created with the certificated bargaining units to help with the development of the improvements to the teacher evaluation system.*
- *\$13 million for class size reduction to English Language Arts and Math in grades 8-9. An additional \$13 million will be provided to increase secondary school counseling services.*
- *Continued protections for the District for budgetary uncertainties.*
- *A class size committee to explore options and strategies for further reducing class sizes.*
- *A more efficient grievance processing system that requires informal discussion prior to the filing of a grievance.*
- *Additional leave options to promote wellness among employees.*
- *Greater collaboration with UTLA in the assignment process.*
- *Substitutes will be provided additional rights to a meeting with representation.*

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**WHAT ABOUT ME TOO?**

AALA members are aware of the “me too” clause in the contractual agreements between AALA and LAUSD that allows a union the opportunity to reopen salary negotiations should the Board approve a higher raise for another union. In light of the agreement with UTLA, **Dr. Judith Perez**, AALA President, sent the following communication to **Vivian Ekchian**, LAUSD Chief Labor Negotiator:

**Consistent with the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the District and AALA dated June 27, 2014, I am requesting that the District schedule negotiations with AALA.**

**On page 2 of the aforementioned MOU the following is noted “...should the Board of Education approve a higher general percentage increase on the base salary table for another group of employees, AALA will receive comparable treatment.”**

**AALA is interested in quickly addressing and resolving the “me too” clause matter on behalf of our membership.**

Members should be advised that before any negotiations between AALA and the District can begin, the ratification of the District’s agreement with UTLA must take place. According to staff in the Office of Labor Relations, UTLA members will vote on the proposed agreement between May 1 – 7. Votes will be tallied and announced on May 8, 2015. If ratified, the Board of Education will consider it for adoption at their meeting on May 12, 2015, and since all Board Members have voiced support for the agreement, we assume it will pass. Once adopted, AALA can initiate the formal negotiation process with the District which should result in administrators being offered a salary agreement that is on par with their colleagues in UTLA. We will keep you apprised.

**CAMPAIGN UPDATES**

As is common in campaigns for public office, the nearer the election date, the nastier the mailings have become. Unfortunately, this is what is happening in the races for seats on the LAUSD Board of Education in Districts 3, 5, and 7, where AALA has endorsed retired principal **Scott Schmerelson**, incumbents **Bennett Kayser** and **Dr. Richard Vladovic**, respectively.

In District 3, voters are receiving mailers alleging that Scott will take money away from music and arts to increase the bureaucracy. Of course the verbiage is nebulous and misleading and not rooted in fact. Yet, with pictures of children with shocked looks on their faces, the flyers do catch your eye. Another paints him as an enemy of working class families. Guess who is behind this latest onslaught? These flyers are distributed by something called the Parent Teacher Alliance which receives its major funding from the California Charter Schools Association Advocates, an Independent Expenditure Committee.

## **DISTRICT PROPOSES CUTS TO SRLDP**

Part of the proposed budget submitted last month to the LAUSD Board of Education included a reduction of \$16 million in the School Readiness Language Development Program (SRLDP) resulting in a 45% decrease in the number of classes. This was included as part of the fiscal stabilization plan for 2015-16 and is particularly concerning because it is such a huge cut to the program. No one can argue the effectiveness or overall benefits children receive when they participate in high-quality pre-K programs. Research is clear that those who do participate have higher rates of achievement.

A recent study released by UC Berkeley found gaps in cognitive skills between white and Mexican-American children as early as age 2. Gaps were particularly apparent in children of immigrant families. As a school district with a significant number of children whose parents are immigrants, it is incumbent upon LAUSD to seriously consider the impact that reducing SRLDP would have. While the report showed that the children had about the same level of social and emotional skills, by age 2, 80 percent of the Mexican-American children had weaker preliteracy skills. Granted, children as young as 2 cannot enroll in SRLDP classes, but given the trend, high-quality preschool offerings are critical.

## SRLDP (Cont.)

The study tracked almost 5,000 children from birth to 30 months of age. The Mexican-American children were from both English- and Spanish-speaking homes; however, a larger percentage of the white mothers had some college background. Another difference was that about 60 percent of the white mothers reported that they read to their children daily, while only around 20 percent of the Mexican-Americans did. White mothers also asked more questions and talked more with their toddlers. The lead author of the study, **Dr. Bruce Fuller**, said that while increasing quality preschool programs for 3- and 4-year-olds is important in closing the achievement gap, more support is needed for younger children also. He sees the new funding formula for California schools as a “rare opportunity to invest more heavily in early childhood programs.”

Even *Los Angeles Times* columnist **Sandy Banks** is taking on the District’s proposal to reduce SRLDP classes. In her article in the April 21 edition of the newspaper, she penned, “...*the system’s smallest students are being asked to sacrifice: To save \$16 million, the district has proposed cutting 4,000 preschool slots at 138 elementary schools. In a district with a \$7.3 billion budget...that seems penny-wise and pound foolish to me.*”

AAALA appreciates the budget challenges **Superintendent Cortines** will have to address for the 2015-2016 school year. The District is in the process of restoring needed services districtwide that were either eliminated or reduced during the recent recession. We urge the District to create a long-term plan for high-quality preschool options for the coming years.

## HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ: *THE SHINGLES VACCINE*

### **What is “shingles” and who should get vaccinated?**

Shingles, or herpes zoster, is an acute viral inflammation caused by a reactivation of the herpes virus that causes chickenpox. Disease characteristics include skin blisters and pain that runs along affected sensory nerves. The herpes virus is never fully cleared from the body and can reactivate and cause skin inflammation characteristic of shingles decades after having had chickenpox. To prevent those 60 years and older from getting shingles, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommend the shingles vaccine, Zostavax®. Typically, the older a person is, the more severe the effects of shingles.

### **Who should not get the shingles vaccine?**

People who should NOT get the shingles vaccine include:

- People who have had a life-threatening or severe allergic reaction to gelatin, the antibiotic neomycin or any other component of the shingles vaccine.
- Those with a weakened immune system because of –
  - HIV/AIDS or another disease that affects the immune system
  - Drugs that affect the immune system, such as steroids
  - Cancer treatment, such as radiation or chemotherapy
  - Cancer affecting the bone marrow or lymphatic system, such as leukemia or lymphoma
- Women who are or might be pregnant.

## FAQ (Cont.)

### Where do I get the shingles vaccine?

- **Kaiser HMO** – If the primary care physician (PCP) deems the immunization medically necessary, active employees and retirees under 65 may obtain the shingles vaccine cost free from their PCP.
- **Health Net HMO:** If considered medically necessary, the vaccine is covered under the plan's medical benefits (not the pharmacy benefit). Members obtain these immunizations cost-free directly from their PCP. If the immunization is not immediately available, your PCP's office will arrange to obtain the immunization or direct you to a location that will provide the covered benefit.
- **Anthem Blue Cross Select HMO and EPO:** The shingles vaccination is covered by the medical plan, not the prescription plan, and is cost-free if considered medically necessary. If the PCP does not have the vaccine on hand, the member may get immunized at a CVS pharmacy, pay the full cost of the vaccination and then get reimbursed by Anthem by submitting the receipt and a [Member Claim Form](#) directly to Anthem at:

- **Medicare Advantage Plans:**
  - **Kaiser Senior Advantage** members get the vaccine cost-free during an office visit.
  - **Health Net Seniority Plus** members should get a prescription from their PCP, pick up the vaccine at their network pharmacy for a \$7.50 copay and then get immunized at the PCP's office.
  - **UHC retirees** get vaccinated by their PCP with no copay if the purpose of the PCP office visit is solely for the purpose of getting the shot. If the main reason for the office is to check a medical condition and the shingles vaccine is part of the visit, then the member pays for the office visit.

## NEW SCHOOL FOR GIRLS

The LAUSD Board of Education unanimously approved an all-female science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) school to open on the campus of Los Angeles High School in the 2016-17 school year. AALA President **Dr. Judith Perez** sent a letter to District leadership in support of the school. The Girls Academic Leadership Academy's mission is to reduce the achievement and participation gap between male and female students in the STEM areas. Research has shown that girls, particularly, seem to excel in STEM courses when enrolled in single-sex schools. The Academy's curriculum will be a rigorous, college preparatory one that will lead the girls directly to college. The school will open with students in grades six through nine and will add an additional grade each year, becoming 6-12 by 2020.
