\$ TIME TO SAY GOODBYE \$

Megan Reilly, LAUSD Chief Financial Officer, is resigning to become the chief business officer of the Santa Clara County Office of Education. Ms. Reilly came to LAUSD nearly 10 years ago having previously worked at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey as the executive director of Business Services and comptroller. She quickly mastered the nuances of the District's complex finances and funding streams. Ultimately, she learned the ropes of the public education sector, and successfully navigated the District through the Great Recession. Her departure shortly after the Governor's State of the State speech offers the opportunity to review key history and facts of the LAUSD budget history and the current state of financial affairs.

The District's current 2016-17 budget is balanced and includes a modest surplus. **Governor Brown** said in his State of the State speech that the economy is not growing as fast as he had predicted, although he stopped short of saying there are cuts ahead. However, the Legislative Analyst Office is forecasting revenue will be higher than the Governor's projection based on income tax filings this year. Under the recently approved Proposition 30 and the original Proposition 98, this money will provide school districts with more funding under the proportions guaranteed to them.

Over the years, Ms. Reilly has highlighted impending deficits deterring the District from providing raises or strengthening and restoring programs cut by the Great Recession. However, **President Obama** provided HOPE and stimulus to the tune of \$1.3 billion dollars. The stimulus dollars kept the system afloat while AALA members sacrificed to keep the District thriving.

The morale and angst AALA members are experiencing, especially in the Supervisory Department, as they currently have no right to the positions in which they have faithfully served the District, coupled with the 30% "exercise" and the recent resolution that Beaudry be leased or sold, needs to be addressed and ameliorated. AALA strongly advocates this can be done by:

- ✓ Leveraging the approximate \$500 million dollar budget carryover this year to make sure no AALA member is reduced in force. Historically, the District has had a carryover each year since 2009. Let this be the year the District sees the glass as half-full rather than half-empty, and uses it to acknowledge the worth of those in the AALA family by not changing their basis, for example.
- ✓ Authoring a law to repeal AB 1200, which requires school districts to project 3-year budgets for the current year and two years out. AB 1200 resulted from the 1990 bankruptcy of the Richmond Unified School District. AB 1200 is arcane as it calculates out-year expenses without including

out-year revenue as the state only allocates revenues for the current year for CFOs to budget. This approach makes District budgeting a perpetual cycle of gloom, doom, direness, and the most awful foreboding.

- ✓ Emphasizing the District's revenues instead of expenses instead of the other way around is an important paradigm shift. For example, every January there is a glimpse of what the tax revenues will be on April 15. Sending a message the District will have a clearer picture of the year ahead in the May revision is important, especially for those administrators perceiving to be on the "District's" chopping block.
- ✓ Partnering between the Superintendent, the Board, and the labor partners to search for additional revenue streams is a sheer necessity. If the city is asking taxpayers for additional funds to address homelessness and the county to build trains, then surely the citizenry is ready to support smaller class sizes and an assistant principal at every elementary school, as examples.

In the meantime, AALA is confident and optimistic Budget Services is crunching the numbers to leave AALA and its members whole for the 2017-18 school year. In this spirit, AALA can double-down and work to everyone's maximum capacity to ensure the District's mission of 100% graduation for every student.

In closing, AALA wishes the fondest of adieus to Ms. Reilly, and wishes her all the best in her next endeavor!

UNIT J RATIFIES CONTRACT

Members of Unit J overwhelmingly approved the 2015-2018 successor agreement with the District with 98% voting in the affirmative. President's Report

1. **AALA membership numbers:** Non-school, 806; school-based, 1,744; classified, 306; total, 2,856.
2. **Unit J Negotiations:** A tentative agreement was reached with the District on January 25, 2017. Ratification will take place February 3-7, 2017.
3. **March 15 Letters:** Permanent school-based administrators will not get letters. All supervisory and new administrators will.

HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ – IS IT A COLD OR THE FLU?

What is the difference between a cold and the flu?

The flu and the common cold are both respiratory illnesses but they are caused by different viruses. Because these two types of illnesses have similar symptoms, it can be difficult to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone.

What are the symptoms of the flu versus the symptoms of a cold?

In general, the flu is worse than the common cold, and symptoms such as fever, body aches, extreme tiredness, and dry cough are more common and intense. Colds are usually milder than the flu. People with colds are more likely to have a runny or stuffy nose. Colds generally do not result in serious health problems, such as pneumonia, bacterial infections, or hospitalizations.

How does the flu spread?

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with it cough, sneeze, or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might also get the flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching his or her own mouth, eyes, or nose.

What is the period of contagiousness?

You may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning one day before symptoms develop and up to five to seven days after becoming sick. Some people, especially young children and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for an even longer time.

What health practices may help prevent getting the flu?

- Get your seasonal flu shot. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) says this is the best way to prevent getting the flu.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick and when you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.

- If possible, stay home from work or school and do not run errands when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- Cover your mouth and nose with tissue when sneezing or coughing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.
- Wash your hands often to help protect you from germs. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at home, work, or school.

When would I need to take an antiviral drug for the flu?

Antiviral drugs are used to treat the very sick and should be administered within two days of flu onset. Your health practitioner will help you determine your need for one of the three available antiviral drugs—Tamiflu® (generic name oseltamivir), Relenza®, and Rapivab®.

DEVOS IS SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

A historical tie-breaking vote cast by **Vice President Pence** confirmed the nomination of **Betsy DeVos** as the next U.S. Department of Education Secretary. With two Republicans opposing her nomination along with all 48 of the Democrats, the Senate vote was 50-50 and according to the Senate historian, this is the first time that a vice president has had to cast a vote in order to break a tie on a cabinet nomination. Democratic senators spent all night on the Senate floor speaking in protest of her nomination in an attempt to get just one more Republican vote, to no avail.

Mrs. DeVos has no experience in education and has been a vocal supporter of educational choice through charter schools and vouchers. Her patented lack of experience and knowledge about education and federal law, programs, and policy, coupled with some of her strange statements during her confirmation hearings (giving guns to teachers to protect children from bears and being unaware that the Individuals with Disabilities in Education Act was federal law) has raised alarm throughout the country. Lawmakers received hundreds of thousands of messages from constituents urging them not to vote for the nominee who has been opposed by virtually every major educational organization. However, that did not sway the majority of Republicans who voted for her merely to show their support for the president, because it certainly could not have been due to her qualifications.

It is truly a sad day for public education. As noted in *The Root*, an online newspaper, “While DeVos has absolutely no qualifications to hold the position and bombed during her confirmation hearing, she is a large donor...and is a personal friend of the president...There is no saving grace here; she is going to be tragic. And the worst part is that children are going to suffer. But she is rich and friends with the president—which is really all you need to run a major governmental agency in this administration.”

COMPLIANCE WITH FOSTER YOUTH GUIDELINES

AAALA thanks Dr. Joseph Green, UCP Coordinator, for providing this information.

As amended by AB 379, Section 48853 of the California Education Code now provides that a complaint of noncompliance with the requirement to issue checkout grades and partial credits earned by foster students may be filed with the local educational agency under the Uniform Complaint Procedures (UCP) process.

The Office of General Counsel's Educational Equity Compliance Office has seen a rise in the volume of complaints being filed under UCP alleging failure to comply with these requirements. It is recommended that schools with foster youth ensure that staff be designated and trained to make certain that compliance is met and ensure students are successful in accessing the District's programs and pathways to graduation. Please note, the legal requirement for accepting and issuing partial credits also extends to students involved in the juvenile justice system and those experiencing homelessness.
