AALA'S ENDORSEMENTS FOR THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

At the AALA Representative Assembly meeting on Thursday, February 2, the PAC Steering Committee presented its recommendations for the candidates AALA should endorse in the LAUSD Board of Education elections on March 7 and on May 16 (if a run-off is required). Appreciation is extended to the following members of the committee for their hard work in developing their recommendations: Candace Lee and Martha Peralta (Adult); Nery Paiz and Wing Leung (Elementary); Jason Camp and Brian Sida (Secondary); Kevin Kilpatrick and Dr. Marguerite Williams (Supervisory); Steven Johnson and David Montes (Unit J); Juan A. Flecha, AALA President; and David Tokofsky, Strategist.

In January, the PAC Steering Committee invited the thirteen candidates for Board Districts 2, 4, and 6 to interviews. All came, with the exception of three.

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Candidates received AALA's core values in advance, which may be accessed <u>HERE</u>. Interviews were 30 minutes in length and with the exception of the two incumbents, **Mónica García** and **Steve Zimmer**, all candidates were asked the same six questions on the following topics: background information and policies; role of Board Members; AALA's core values; administrators' roles and workload; political base, fundraising, and campaign; final comments and questions.

The committee believes its recommended candidates are true advocates for public schools, are against privatization, and will ensure that all students are provided access and equity to a quality education. Following lively discussion, the PAC Council voted to endorse the following candidates:

- Board District 2—Lisa Alva
- Board District 4—Steve Zimmer
- Board District 6—Imelda Padilla
- L.A. City Council Seat 7—Mónica Ratliff

The Council also voted to donate \$1,100 (the maximum allowed by law) to the candidates for the Board of Education and \$750 to Mónica Ratliff. These funds come from AALA's PAC account, which is separate from AALA's operating budget. AALA members can choose whether to direct a portion of their AALA dues to the PAC.

NEW UNIT J CONTRACT

On January 25, 2017, AALA and LAUSD reached a tentative settlement on Unit J's successor agreement, 2015-2018. Unit J's ratification process will take place between <u>Friday</u>, <u>February 3, 2017</u>, and <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>February 7, 2017</u>, via email. Assuming the agreement is ratified, it will go to the Board of Education for approval on February 14, 2017. It then becomes Unit J's official contract from July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2018. Following is a summary of Unit J's tentative 2015-2018 agreement.

- o <u>Job Classifications</u>: Sixteen job classifications will be added to Unit J. One classification will immediately become District-represented, and an additional two will become District-represented once the individuals in these classification promote, retire, or separate from the District.
- Adding new job classifications: AALA may request to add job classifications to Unit J between November 1 and December 31 of each year with a decision provided by March 1 of the following year.
- Changes in Hours of Work: Employee must be given advance notification of at least 10 business days, when practicable.
- Extended Hours of Work: Flex time may be taken, with prior approval, in up to two subsequent pay periods and increased during an emergency at the discretion of the supervisor. Granting and scheduling of flex time shall not be done on an arbitrary or discriminatory basis. Emergency call responses are subject to the same. Performance of duties of immediate supervisor: If a Unit J member demonstrates s/he performed 75% of the duties of their immediate supervisor who was absent for more than five days, flex time may be offered.
- O Personal Necessity Leave: Increased from one occasion to two. Personal necessity can be used for attending a "significant event of a compelling nature" that an employee cannot disregard, such as a wedding or graduation. Employees may also use two days to attend professional development, subject to specific criteria.
- o <u>Professional Development Leave</u>: District may grant one paid day to a permanent employee to attend professional development activities under specified conditions.
- Salary Overpayment: Payroll Branch will notify the employee in writing and the overpayment will be deducted at a minimum of \$300 per pay period. If the total amount exceeds \$7,200, recovery will be divided into 24 installments.
- o <u>Longevity Increment</u>: Effective July 1, 2017, after completing qualifying years of service, the increments are \$25 per pay period after 10 years, and \$40 per pay period after 15 years.
- o <u>Health and Welfare</u>: The revised contract eliminates the Employee Assistance Program for lack of use. Employees can access these services through their medical plans.
- For the 2016-2017 school year, if the Board of Education approves an across-the-board percentage increase on the base salary table for UTLA or AALA certificated, Unit J will receive equitable treatment.
- o <u>For the 2017-2018 school year</u>, the District and AALA will reopen negotiations on base salary rate and on a total of two additional articles.

HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ – FEBRUARY IS AMERICAN HEART MONTH – ASSESS YOUR RISK

Why is there a national focus on the heart?

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), heart disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women in the United States, with one in four deaths due to the disease. A heart attack strikes every 42 seconds, and someone dies from a heart attack every minute. High blood pressure, high LDL cholesterol, and smoking are three key controllable risk factors for heart disease. Factors we cannot control are family history of early heart disease and our age—being 55 or older for women, and 45 or older for men.

I have high blood pressure and take medication. How can I keep my blood pressure at safe levels? Here are steps you can take:

- Know your blood pressure numbers.
- If you have high blood pressure, set a goal with your doctor to lower your pressure.
- Take your blood pressure medication, as prescribed.
- Address high-risk behaviors by stopping smoking, managing cholesterol levels, losing weight, avoiding high-sodium foods, eating more healthy foods (fruits/vegetables), and exercising at least 30 minutes a day.
- Ask your doctor about taking low-dose aspirin.

What do the two numbers mean when my blood pressure is taken?

Blood pressure is measured by using two sets of numbers. The first or top number represents your systolic blood pressure—the pressure in your arteries when your heart beats. The second or bottom number is your diastolic blood pressure—the pressure in your blood vessels when your heart rests between beats. The chart below from the CDC shows normal to high blood pressure numbers:

Blood Pressure Levels			
Normal	Systolic: less than 120 mmHg		
	Diastolic: less than 80 mmHg		
(prehypertension)At risk	Systolic: 120–139 mmHg		
	Diastolic: 80–89 mmHg		
High	Systolic: 140 mmHg or higher		
	Diastolic: 90 mmHg or higher		

I heard that there has been a change in when blood pressure treatment should begin. Have the new guidelines been implemented?

In 2014, a U.S. panel redefined high blood pressure for those over age 60 as 150/90 instead of the current 140/90. The American Heart Association opposed the change, pointing a lack of evidence to warrant a change. A study published in 2016 found that having systolic pressure between 140 and 149 posed a 70%

increased risk of stroke. There is still controversy over the newer guidelines, with the American Heart Association, American College of Cardiology, and the CDC considering people to have high blood pressure at 140/90 or higher.

DEVOS CONFIRMED BY SENATE COMMITTEE

On Tuesday, January 31, 2017, The U.S. Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor & Pensions (HELP) voted 12-11 to approve the nomination of **Betsy DeVos** for Secretary of the United States Department of Education (ED). The vote split along party lines, but means that her nomination will go to the full Senate for final confirmation. The date for that vote has yet to be set, but if the Senate continues to vote according to party, with 52 Republicans and 48 Democrats, she will become the next Secretary of Education. However, two Republicans on the committee, **Senators Susan Collins**, R-Maine, and **Lisa Murkowski**, R-Alaska, expressed serious concerns about DeVos and would not commit to voting for her in the full Senate. Both said they were worried about DeVos' stance on traditional public schools and her understanding of the U.S. Department of Education's role. If they decide to oppose her nomination, the vote will result in a tie, which will mean that **Vice President Pence** will then cast his ballot, resulting in her confirmation.

ANNUAL POSTING REQUIREMENT OF WORK-RELATED INJURIES & ILLNESSES

California State law requires every District school and office to display the Annual Summary of Work-Related Injuries and Illnesses (Cal/OSHA Form 300A) in a conspicuous place where notices to employees are customarily posted. This form must be posted by **February 1** and remain posted until April 30 each year. You may refer to Reference Guide 5693.2, Cal/OSHA Log of Injuries and Illnesses, available at Inside LAUSD and on the Office of Environmental Health and Safety (OEHS) website.

Please ensure the site-specific logs are posted at every school and office to maintain compliance and prevent Cal/OSHA from issuing citations. A completed Cal/OSHA Form 300A will be mailed to each site or may be downloaded at http://achieve.lausd.net/Page/3639. Remember, there is also a requirement to verify that the log has been posted on the Administrator's Online Certification System. The due date for this item is also February 1, 2017. THE ROLE OF THE COMPLEX PROJECT MANAGER (CPM)

The role of the Complex Project Manager (CPM) is to be the principal's single point of contact for all facilities-related activities at the school. This includes repairs, modernization projects, alterations & improvements requests, new construction projects, custodial support, or any other facilities-related function. The CPM will also help identify, resolve, and respond to safety issues, complaints, and inquiries. Essentially, the CPM's function is to help carry the facilities workload for the school-site administrator so that he/she can spend more time and energy on the school's instructional needs.

The CPM is the administrator's facilities advocate and expert and will support (or represent) him/her at parent community meetings, project planning sessions, and construction meetings. Below are some, but not all, of the duties with which the CPM will be happy to assist:

- Operations issues, including custodial, gardening, tree maintenance, and pest management.
- Coordinating the planning, organizing, prioritizing, and scheduling of the school's maintenance and operation's needs.
- Overseeing and organizing the on and off hours responses to calls concerning vandalism, fires, and other emergencies.
- The preparation of budgets and estimates for alterations and improvements projects.
- Supervising and participating in personnel matters such as employee performance evaluations, leaves of absences, grievances, and disciplinary actions.
- Coordinating facilities projects at schools in consultation with site administrators, local district staff, senior management personnel, as well as project managers, architects, and engineers.

While these are only a few of the duties of CPMs, administrators should consider them as the one-stop shop for ALL of the site's needs. Therefore, if there is a facilities issue—anything from the grass to the roof and anything in-between—call your CPM! He/she will be there to assist!

Customer service is a key component to our excellence as an organization. Beginning in February 2017, M&O will send a notification email to the principal and/or designee when the CPM visits a school site. Within the email will be a link to a satisfaction survey. Information provided in response to the survey will help identify areas for improvement as well as praise for our service.


