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The negotiations team is currently fast at work reviewing the hundreds of comments submitted in response to the April 2017 questionnaire/survey which more than 800 members completed. The membership's priorities are: compensation, health benefits, administrative workload, and promotional opportunities. If you did not respond to the survey, your interests are still important to us. Please feel welcome to email any team member with ideas and suggestions. As importantly, we are meeting every two weeks to train in the negotiations process. Some important tenets to ensure the team is united are:

- ❖ A strong commitment to a common set of principles is core to the team.
- ❖ The negotiations team must trust each other.
- ❖ The team must have equal information and feel an equal sense of responsibility to fully participate in the process.
- ❖ Each member must have an equal chance to debate an issue or voice an opinion before a decision is made.
- ❖ Each member has the responsibility to be open and honest about their feelings.
- ❖ The team understands the importance of confidentiality and not sharing what is happening at the table while negotiations are taking place.

In addition, the team is:

- ❖ Reviewing and analyzing the contract; looking at contractual language that needs to be strengthened; and ascertaining other problematic areas based on members' experiences and past grievances; and
- ❖ Listing by importance AALA's bargaining proposals.

The team's hardest task is drafting proposals, developing supporting arguments, anticipating the District's counter-arguments, and identifying potential compromise positions. The team will need more sessions to

accomplish this before officially entering into negotiations with the District. In the meantime, your support for the negotiations team is invaluable. You can support by:

- ❖ Trusting the team and only publicly making statements of support.

- ❖ Attending Representative Assembly meetings. **The next one is Thursday, October 5, 2017, at the AALA offices.**
- ❖ Encouraging members to be in good standing by completing the required paperwork to exit agency fee status and become eligible to participate in the ratification vote. **Call 213.484.2226 to confirm you are a member in good standing.**
- ❖ Always remember it is **our** contract and we **all** must actively work to make it effective.

LAUSD BEGINS THE SCHOOL YEAR WITH FOUR NEW SCHOOLS

Some of the students returning to school on August 15, 2017, entered four new schools, one of which, Maywood Center for Enriched Studies (MaCES), is a brand new facility. The enrollment of 1,100 sixth through eleventh grade students at MaCES will allow Bell High School to finally come off of the multi-track year-round calendar after 36 years and be on the same schedule as all of the other 1,000+ schools in the District. MaCES, a magnet school, is the last school to be built with funding from the District's \$20 billion school building project. **Gabriel Duran**, Principal, says that the school is opening at capacity, with 300 students on a waiting list, and has enrolled students who live in the neighborhood but were previously bused out to other schools in the District and also some who are coming from the East L.A., Gardena, and the Fairfax areas.

Horace Mann Middle School has been a fixture in South L.A. for some time. However, its enrollment has dropped from a peak high of 2,000 students to about 350 last year. It is opening this year as Mann UCLA Community School and is in a partnership with the university's Graduate School of Education and Information Studies. Principal **Orlando Johnson** has been at the school three years and was excited to join with UCLA to help stop the decline in enrollment and turn the school around. The school is adding the ninth grade this year and anticipates that at least half of last year's eighth grade graduates will return. UCLA has worked with the school community during the past two years to develop a plan for the school. Some of the new proposals include: becoming a local initiative model school, a new curriculum built around a "learn, see, do" model with themes for each grade level; focusing on college attendance; increasing enrichment and extracurricular activities; and freedom from some contractual requirements for the staff.

The Boys Academic Leadership Academy, located on the campus of Washington Prep HS, opened on August 15 enrolling sixth- and seventh-grade boys with plans to add a new grade each year. It is the first boys-only school in the District and is the complement to the Girls Academic Leadership Academy that opened last year. The curriculum is STEAM focused and students will eventually be able to take classes at L.A. Southwest College while they are in high school.

New Middle School Pathway, opened with sixth- and seventh-grade students on the campus of Westchester Enriched Sciences Magnet High School. It was developed in conjunction with Loyola Marymount University and will serve as the School of Education's teaching demonstration site. Principal **Kyle Hunsberger** is excited about working with LMU to implement STEM educational experiences and practices at the school.

HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ— WHAT IS A PREEXISTING CONDITION?

A preexisting condition is a health problem for which a person has received treatment prior to the start of new health insurance coverage. Under Obamacare, health insurance companies cannot refuse coverage or charge more just because someone has a preexisting condition. In the recent legislative efforts to repeal and replace Obamacare, preexisting conditions were a major sticking point. Both House and Senate health care proposals failed to pass, in part, due to public outcry over not unconditionally guaranteeing coverage for preexisting conditions.

Do many people have preexisting conditions?

According to a brief by the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services, in 2011, 51% (about 131 million) of nonelderly Americans had preexisting health conditions. This percentage grows as the population ages, reaching 84% for those between the ages of 55 and 64.

Health insurers, prior to full implementation of Obamacare, routinely collected medical history and then either denied coverage, charged higher premiums, and/or limited benefits to individuals. As a result, 34%, or 44.5 million individuals, paid higher than standard premiums, and 36%, or 47.2 million, were denied coverage. About half of those with preexisting conditions received employer-provided health coverage, some of which required a waiting period for those with prior medical conditions.

What is considered a preexisting condition?

According to Kaiser Family Foundation's 2016 review of field underwriting guidelines, insurers declined coverage for a number of medical conditions, as shown in the table on the next page. Personalized Learning Systems



Starting with the 2017-2018 school year, the use of the Schoology Gradebook, which integrates with MiSiS, will be implemented at all secondary schools as required by the Modified Consent Decree. The MiSiS secondary gradebook has been transitioned to the Schoology Gradebook effective immediately. The historical records in MiSiS will still be available to teachers throughout the 2017-2018 school year. The new gradebook can be accessed through the Learning Management System (LMS) using your LAUSD Single Sign On (SSO) at lms.lausd.net.

Per MEM-5788.6: *School-Site Professional Development Priorities-Banked Time Tuesdays for Middle and High Schools (2017-2018)*, schools are required to provide the Schoology Gradebook e-learning modules to all secondary teachers, counselors, and other certificated staff. To access your Schoology Gradebook e-learning modules course, login to Schoology at lms.lausd.net using your LAUSD SSO. Locate the “**Courses**” tab and select the “**LAUSD Schoology Gradebook: Secondary Training**” course.

The Personalized Learning Systems (PLS) Department, which is a cross-divisional team designed to support employees’ use of LMS, has created a *Principal’s Toolkit: Online Gradebook Readiness and Implementation* group that contains resources principals can use to prepare teachers for a successful online gradebook implementation.
