UNIT J, TIME TO VOTE!

AALA's AWESOME Unit J Bargaining Team reached a Tentative Agreement (TA) with the District on Thursday, March 21, 2019. Click [HERE](#) to view the actual agreement which follows the signature page; contract deletions are shown by strike outs; new sections and subsections are underlined.

Dr. Judith Perez, Lead Negotiator, **Phyllis Lott**, Vice President, **Dave Montes**, Director, **Lisa Marine**, Director, **Laura Ramirez**, Senior Steward, **Gizella Czene**, Job Steward, negotiated items of importance to our members, including competitive salaries and improved working conditions. Please take a moment to read the TA. In the meantime, listed below are some of the highlights.

2017-18 Reopener Agreement

For the 2017-18 school year, the District and Unit J agree to the following with respect to compensation:

All bargaining Unit J members shall receive a 3% on-schedule wage increase applied to all pay scale groups and levels of the base salary tables, retroactive to July 1, 2017.

2018-2021 Successor Agreement

For the 2018-19 school year, the District and Unit J agree to the following with respect to compensation: All bargaining Unit J represented employees shall receive a 3% on-schedule wage increase applied to all pay scale groups and levels of the base salary tables, retroactive to July 1, 2018.

Article XIV - WAGES AND SALARIES

Section 10.3: Effective July 1, 2018, the longevity increment for years of qualifying District service shall be:

- \$40 per pay period after 10 years
- \$55 per pay period after 15 years
- \$70 per pay period after 20 years

Note the 10-year increment was raised from **\$25** to **\$40**; the 15-year increment was raised from **\$40** to **\$55**; and the bargaining team successfully negotiated a **THIRD** career increment of **\$70** per pay period after 20 years of service, retroactive to July 1, 2018.

Article IX - HOURS OF WORK

Section 2.2 now includes: Granting and/or scheduling use of flexible reduced hours shall not be done on an arbitrary, capricious, or discriminatory basis, nor shall it be denied or limited for any of these reasons.

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TIME TO VOTE (Cont.)

Article XV, HEALTH AND WELFARE

Retiree Health Benefits: For employees hired on or after April 1, 2019, years of qualifying service and age must total 87 and must include a minimum of 30 consecutive years of service with the District immediately prior to retirement.

457(b) Deferred Compensation Plan Enrollment: Unit J bargaining unit members may voluntarily enroll.

Article XIX, TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

Allowable tuition reimbursement shall be increased to a maximum of \$1,100 for every 12-month period.

Herewith are the important next steps:

1. Only members in good standing are able to vote on the Tentative Agreement. Every voice matters when it comes to voting.
2. Contract ratification voting is scheduled to begin on March 28, 2019, and end on April 3, 2019.
3. AALA will forward the results of the ratification vote to the Superintendent and the Board of Education on April 4, 2019, and announce the results in the *Update*.
4. AALA will request that ratification of the TA be placed on the Board's Order of Business for April 23, 2019.
5. The effective date of retroactive pay and rate adjustments will be announced shortly thereafter.

AALA is pleased negotiations have concluded, allowing all of us to focus on our most important work - improving student achievement every day. And while we wish we had been able to win everything we aimed for at the start, we are proud we were able to move the District on important issues facing frontline Unit J managers. Our gratitude is extended to the Superintendent, the Board of Education, and the Office of Labor Relations for listening to our concerns and bringing these negotiations to a satisfactory conclusion.

IT'S OFFICIAL – GOLDBERG VS. REPENNING

The county registrar of voters certified the March 5 election results last Friday, March 24, and **Heather Repenning** will be opposing AALA-endorsed candidate **Jackie Goldberg** in the race for the District 5 seat on the LAUSD Board of Education. Ms. Goldberg had a strong lead with 48% of the votes cast, while her second and third place opponents each obtained about 13% of the votes. It was an extremely close race for second place and Ms. Repenning barely defeated District counselor and Huntington Park council member **Graciela Ortiz** by a mere 31 votes. Ms. Ortiz had until Wednesday, March 27, to request a recount, and as of press time, we had not heard that she has done so. The runoff election will take place on May 14.

Ms. Repenning has a child in LAUSD and was a former aide to Mayor **Eric Garcetti**. She has said that she will not take any money from charter school operators, but did receive \$100,000 for her campaign from charter supporter **Eli Broad**. Jackie Goldberg supports strengthening oversight and transparency of charters and improving school funding by taxing the state's wealthy. She received strong support from both UTLA and AALA and has received the endorsement of her former opponent, AALA member, and principal **Dr. Cynthia Gonzalez**, who placed fourth in the contest.

HEALTHCARE FAQs— *ARE YOU SLEEP DEPRIVED?*

Do you find yourself more tired since the change to daylight saving time (DST)? If so, you're not alone. Research shows that this annual transition disrupts the circadian rhythm and may induce adverse changes in sleep quality and quantity. For most individuals, adjustment to the new time takes up to 5–7 days. Several studies suggest that the DST transition can impair mood and may increase the short-term risk of accidents, injuries, and even heart attacks.

Beyond the effects of the DST, National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI) statistics show that sleep is often the first thing that busy people squeeze out of their schedules. Until the 1950s, most people believed sleep to be a passive, dormant part of our daily lives. We have since learned that our brains are very active during sleep. Moreover, sleep studies are beginning to show the many ways that sleep affects our daily functioning and our physical and mental health.

Some national statistics on sleep:

- More than 35% of Americans get fewer than 7 hours of sleep each night.
- Between 60% and 76% of high school students are getting fewer than 8 hours of sleep on school nights.
- Insufficient sleep and insomnia are more prevalent in women, causing a greater risk for health problems.
- The U.S. Department of Transportation estimates that drowsy driving was responsible for 90,000 crashes, 44,000 injuries, and more than 800 deaths in 2015.

What is sleep deprivation or sleep deficiency?

- You don't get enough sleep (sleep deprivation).
- You sleep at the wrong time of day (you're out of sync with your body's natural clock).
- You don't sleep well, or don't get the different types of sleep that your body needs.
- You have a sleep disorder, such as insomnia, sleep apnea, restless leg syndrome, or narcolepsy that prevents you from getting enough sleep or causes poor quality sleep.

What happens if you don't get enough sleep each night?

According to the NHLBI, research finds that a persistent lack of sleep is associated with health conditions such as heart disease, high blood pressure, diabetes, obesity, and even certain types of cancer. Researchers are looking at how the body regulates breathing during sleep, how sleep deficiencies affect the whole body, and how biomarkers can help assess sleep health.

How much sleep is enough?

The amount of sleep you need each day will change over the course of your life. Although sleep needs vary from person to person, the NHLBI chart below shows general recommendations for different age groups:

Age	Recommended Amount of Sleep
Infants aged 4-12 months	12-16 hours a day (including naps)
Children aged 1-2 years	11-14 hours a day (including naps)

Age	Recommended Amount of Sleep
Children aged 3-5 years	10-13 hours a day (including naps)
Children aged 6-12 years	9-12 hours a day
Teens aged 13-18 years	8-10 hours a day
Adults aged 18 years or older	7-8 hours a day

2018/2019 ANNUAL FORM 700 DUE APRIL 2

Administrators and other school-site filers are reminded that the annual state-mandated *Statement of Economic Interests* (Form 700) filing deadline is fast approaching. The 2018/2019 Annual Form 700 is due **Tuesday, April 2, 2019**. Principals are asked to remind other school-site filers of their filing obligation as well. School-site filers include: assistant principals, senior financial managers, financial managers, coordinators, and specialists (only coordinators and specialists with financial responsibilities). All filers can access the materials needed to complete the filing by visiting the “Form 700 Center” on the Ethics Office website, <https://achieve.lausd.net/Page/14313>, which includes help tools and blank forms. The Ethics Office has created Form 700s specific for each Local District, to assist school-site filers in accurately completing their filings.

Send the original signed Form 700 to the Ethics Office via U.S. or school mail. Please remember that by law, faxed or electronic copies cannot be accepted. Lastly, leaving or retiring employees must also complete a Leaving Office Form 700 before exiting LAUSD. Please contact the Ethics Office with any questions at 213.241.3330.

CALPERS ELECTION FOR RETIRED MEMBER TO SERVE ON BOARD

Former LAUSD CFO **Henry Jones** has served on the CalPERS Board as the retiree representative since 2007 and his term expires on January 15, 2020. The 13-member CalPERS Board of Administration sets policy and oversees the administration of retirement and health benefits on behalf of California public employers and their active and retired employees. The Board also oversees administration of the pension fund's investments. CalPERS has issued the official Notice of Election including the timeline, information for candidates, eligibility requirements, and other information regarding the election. All nomination materials are due on May 16, 2019, and voting by mail will be from August 30 – September 30. CALSTRS UPDATES—IT'S NEVER TOO EARLY TO PLAN!

NAMING A BENEFICIARY

Are you aware that your retirement system, CalSTRS, may provide benefits to your beneficiaries at the time of your death, whether you are active or retired? Have you completed the necessary beneficiary form for CalSTRS? Unfortunately, many of us think that the beneficiary information provided to the District automatically applies to CalSTRS; however, that is not the case. Your retirement system is a completely separate entity from LAUSD; certificated employees in every public school in California are members of STRS. Therefore, check your CalSTRS account online or review your Annual Statement/Progress Report to see if you have listed a beneficiary. If you have not, do so immediately. The necessary forms can be accessed at the CalSTRS website, www.calstrs.com, by calling 1.800.228.5453, or visiting the CalSTRS Member Service Center in Glendale.

SELECTING AN OPTION

If you are eligible, yet not ready to retire, you can plan now to protect your loved one(s) by making a *preretirement election of an option*. By doing so, in the event of your death, whether working or already retired, your beneficiary will receive a monthly sum from CalSTRS for the rest of that person's life. This is a simple process that has a great impact on both the retiree's and the beneficiary's future earnings since it does reduce the retiree's monthly benefit while he/she is alive but it guarantees an income for the lifetime of the beneficiary. The amount of the reduction is based on the option elected, your age, and the ages of your beneficiary(ies) when the option is selected. It is most common for married couples to select an option, however, anyone may be chosen as the option beneficiary and, in fact, members may elect to have multiple loved ones receive the lifetime benefits.

There are advantages and disadvantages to the preretirement election of an option. The advantages are:

1. If you should die before retirement and you have preselected an option, your beneficiary(ies) will immediately begin to receive the benefits.
2. In most cases, the earlier you select the option, the higher your benefit will be.

There is a disadvantage: If you cancel or change your preretirement election of an option before retiring, your retirement benefit may be reduced for life. Death of your beneficiary is an automatic cancellation.

If you have 30 years of service or are 55 years old with at least 5 years of service credit, we encourage you to determine if selecting an option is best for you and your loved ones.

RESPONDING TO CORRESPONDENCE FROM ATTORNEYS OR LAW FIRMS

Attorneys and law firms send various types of correspondence to school sites. The types of correspondence cover a wide range of topics, including the following: student records, student discipline, special education, personnel records, workers compensation, subpoenas, and lawsuit complaints. Following is guidance on obtaining assistance with various types of legal correspondence:

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CORRESPONDENCE (Cont.)

- Guidance on handling subpoenas for student or personnel records, court appearances, or service of lawsuit complaints can be found in District Bulletin 3489.0, entitled “Procedures for Accepting Service of Summons, Complaints and Subpoenas.” If assistance is needed after reviewing the Bulletin, contact the Office of General Counsel (OGC) at 213.241.6601.
- For correspondence regarding special education matters, consult with the concerned Special Education Service Center.
- For correspondence regarding student discipline, consult with the Student Discipline and Expulsion Unit at 213.202.7555.
- For workers’ compensation-related matters, consult with the Workers Compensation Office in the Division of Risk Management at 213.241.3139.

For assistance with legal correspondence concerning other generalized issues or complaints, consult with your Operations Coordinator. If necessary, the Operations Coordinator will contact the OGC, or will refer you directly to the OGC, for further assistance.
