THE GOOD

THE BAD

Although the results of the voting on Measure EE are disappointing, we must not mourn, but learn from the lesson and organize for better results the next time. In hindsight, Board Members **McKenna** and **Schmerelson** were probably right when they proposed, in May 2018, to put the parcel tax on the November 2018 ballot. They were opposed by the Board majority and Superintendent, and as a result, in this single issue, off-cycle special election, there were fewer than three months to make the public aware of the benefits and necessity for Measure EE. While it was not good timing, it was a good effort. We will be back in Sacramento fighting for revenue and we will try campaigns again locally. AALA stands for the schools and students. AALA stands for common sense and believes in the good of the District. Let's keep fighting for what is right but learn some lessons from these disappointing results. In the issues ahead, we will analyze what went wrong or right in the campaign. Don't hesitate to send us your thoughts about the process; we would like to hear from you.

THE UGLY

School-based administrators, while eligible for permanency, are still subject to what often seems like the District's whims and insensitivity. Administrators know that this is the time of year when the District makes moves for the "good of the overall District." However, the lack of transparency and honesty leaves administrators demoralized and feeling unappreciated. Imagine being an elementary school principal for years on Step 43G of the Master Salary Schedule and for what seems to be arbitrary and capricious reasons, POOF, overnight you get bumped to a lower salary. What is so confounding is that it is not tied to evaluations, concerns over performance, or issues with the school community. From AALA headquarters, our perspective is that the sole reason for the sudden moves without cause is simple: **POLITICS!**

Assistant Principal, EISs are no different. Soon, most of them will be assigned to new schools, different from the ones they have had this year. The request for at least a consistent assignment of schools year-to-year has fallen overall on deaf ears. APEISs will tell you that working conditions would improve for them ever so slightly if they did not have to build relationships at a new set of schools almost **EVERY** year. What's worse is the two-tiered pay scale for APEISs. This year you could be on Step 38G, but come July, you could instantly be on Step 37G, simply because of the schools to which you have been assigned. Mind you, the work does not decrease, despite the location. AALA urges the Superintendent

and the Board of Education to put all APEISs on Step 38G and to keep their assignments relatively the same.

It goes without the saying the most decimated members in our ranks are School Support Administrators. Regrettably, they continue being released without cause and without a soft financial landing. Insult is added to injury when they are required to reapply for the jobs they have been satisfactorily performing for years, are not even invited to interviews, and if they are, they are not selected. This is not how you respectfully treat the human capital the District has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars to grow, and it is certainly not how you treat valued employees.

Perhaps senior leaders and Board Members should notify themselves at the upcoming June meeting that their basis is going to be changed from A to B. Then and only then, might they understand how detrimental their policies are on a very personal and individual basis. As the District tells AALA constantly, it needs the “flexibility” to modify assignments, close positions, and change bases. AALA respectfully requests the District leadership to invoke this same “flexibility” on themselves by changing their basis from A to B. After all, it is a necessary and cost savings measure that will surely help the bottom line.

HEALTHCARE FAQs— AGING AND YOUR EYES

Reprint from National Institute on Aging, January 2017 (Part 1 of 2)

Are you holding the newspaper farther away from your eyes than you used to?

Join the crowd—age can bring changes that affect your eyesight. Some changes are more serious than others, but for many problems, there are things you can do to protect your vision. The key is to have regular eye exams so you can spot problems early.

How Can You Protect Your Eyesight?

Have your eyes checked regularly by an eye care professional—either an ophthalmologist or optometrist. People over age 60 should have dilated eye exams yearly. During this exam, the eye care professional will put drops in your eyes to widen (dilate) your pupils so that he or she can look at the back of each eye. This is the only way to find some common eye diseases that have no early signs or symptoms. If you wear glasses or contact lenses, your prescription should be checked, too. See your doctor regularly to check for diseases like diabetes and high blood pressure. These diseases can cause eye problems if not controlled or treated. See an eye care professional right away if you:

- Suddenly cannot see or everything looks blurry
- See flashes of light
- Have eye pain
- Experience double vision
- Have redness or swelling of your eye or eyelid

What Are Some Common Eye Problems?

The following common eye problems can be easily treated. However, sometimes they can be signs of more serious issues.

- Presbyopia is a slow loss of ability to see close objects or small print. It is normal to have this problem as you get older. People with presbyopia often have headaches or strained, tired eyes. Reading glasses usually fix the problem.
- Floaters are tiny specks or “cobwebs” that seem to float across your vision. You might see them in well-lit rooms or outdoors on a bright day. Floaters can be a normal part of aging. Sometimes they are a sign of a more serious eye problem such as retinal detachment. If you see many new floaters and/or flashes of light, see your eye care professional right away.
- Tearing can come from being sensitive to light, wind, or temperature changes, or having a condition called dry eye. Wearing sunglasses or using eye drops may help. Sometimes tearing is a sign of a more serious eye problem, like an infection or a blocked tear duct. Your eye care professional can treat these problems.
- Eyelid problems can result from different diseases or conditions. Common eyelid problems include red and swollen eyelids or itching, tearing, and crusting of eyelashes during sleep. These problems may be caused by a condition called blepharitis and treated with warm compresses and gentle eyelid scrubs.

7 Tips for Healthy Eyes

- Protect your eyes from too much sunlight by wearing sunglasses that block ultraviolet (UV) radiation and a hat with a wide brim when you are outside.
- Stop smoking.
- Make smart food choices.
- Be physically active and maintain a healthy weight.
- Maintain normal blood pressure.
- Control diabetes (if you have it).
- If you spend a lot of time at the computer or focused on one thing, you can forget to blink. Every 20 minutes, look away about 20 feet for 20 seconds to prevent eye strain.

Summer 2019 EDST Calibration

The District's teacher support and evaluation process, Educator Development and Support: Teachers (EDST), requires administrators to demonstrate knowledge and ability to observe and accurately rate teaching practice. Professional Learning and Leadership Development (PLLD) Branch, in partnership with all local districts, will hold its annual calibration event for directors, principals, assistant principals, and other local district/central office administrators to ensure continued inter-rater reliability in observation of teaching practice.

To participate in the EDST summer calibration, participants will log into the My Professional Growth System (MyPGS) during one of the selected windows (see below for dates). Participants will watch a recorded lesson and align and rate evidence for the 15 *LAUSD Teaching and Learning Framework* focus elements. To indicate which window you prefer to participate, please click [here](#). Based on your selection, you will be enrolled in the specified event and receive directions on how to participate online.

Participants must individually complete the calibration event online within one of the selected windows listed below during their assigned basis:

June 11 – 17, B Basis administrators

July 25 – August 12, A and E Basis administrators

June 11 – 25, A and E Basis administrators

August 5 – 12, B Basis administrators

An administrator cannot receive a lower overall certification status by participating in this calibration event. If observer verification training was completed after July 2018, this calibration event is optional.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO REVIEW TEXTBOOKS

AALA members, your assistance is needed on committees that will conduct textbook reviews, evaluations, and recommendations. During the 2019-2020 school year, elementary, middle, and high school science will be the main focus of the District's textbook adoption cycle, for implementation in Fall 2020. The goal is to purchase the new textbooks during the Spring 2020 Textbook Ordering Roadshows to have them ready for classroom use at the start of Fall Semester 2020.

This summer, committees are being formed to complete the review, evaluation, and recommendations for adoption of science textbooks for the following grade levels and/or courses:

- Science (Grades TK/K – 5/6)
- Integrated Science (Grades 6-8)
- 3-Course Science (High School)

An AALA representative and alternate are needed to serve on each of the three textbook adoption committees. Those who have science teaching experience are especially encouraged to volunteer. Each

committee member must sign a disclosure statement and complete Form 700 (Statement of Economic Interests) to ensure there is no conflict of interest with the publishers involved in the selection process.

Orientation meetings for these committees are scheduled between June 17 and June 24, 2019. Committee members will conduct individual reviews in July 2019. TRAVELING ABROAD THIS SUMMER – BE PREPARED

The following information is cited from the Bureau of Consular Affairs, U.S. State Department.

As the school year comes to an end, many AALA members and their families and friends are making travel plans. If you are preparing for international travel, below are some tips from the Bureau of Consular Affairs, U.S. State Department, and the Centers for Disease Control. According to the Bureau of Consular Affairs, *the first step to an international trip is to read the [Traveler's Checklist](#) to find out things to consider before you go. Pay special attention to the [safety and security information](#) and assess for yourself the risk of traveling to a particular country or region. Some U.S. citizens with [special considerations](#) – such as students, women, and LGBTI travelers – may face additional challenges when abroad. If you do decide to travel, make a plan for what to do if [something goes wrong](#) overseas.”* An effective travel plan includes four major areas: 1) getting informed, 2) getting required documents, 3) getting enrolled, and 4) getting insured.

Get Informed

- Research your destination at www.travel.state.gov to learn about visa requirements, local laws, customs, and medical care in the countries of your visit.
- Check for travel [Alerts and Warnings](#) on the Bureau's website. As a first step in planning any trip abroad, check the Travel Advisories for your intended destination and please be aware that conditions can change rapidly in a country at any time, so check back frequently.
- Learn about health precautions for the countries you are visiting: See the Centers for Disease Control's [Travelers' Health](#) webpage and select your destination. The CDC also provides advice on [food, water, and beverage safety](#) while traveling, as well as how to find a doctor, and other information related to staying healthy while traveling.
- Prepare to handle money overseas and get information for your [specific destination](#) about using cash, debit/credit cards, and ATMs. You can also find out if a tourist visa is required.
- Carry contact details for the nearest [U.S. embassy or consulate](#). The U.S. Department of State can provide help if an emergency occurs. If you are concerned about a loved one who is traveling abroad, you can call 888.407.4747 from the U.S. or Canada; or call 202.501.4444 if you are overseas.

Get Required Documents

- Passports—apply early, or renew your old one, if necessary. Your passport needs to have at least two or more blank pages, and needs to be valid for at least six months after you return

home. Check expiration dates on children’s passports, as they are valid for only five years, not ten. See [passport requirements for children](#).

- Visas—check the [specific destination](#) of your travel.
- Make two photocopies of all your travel documents—leaving one at home with a trusted relative or friend and carry another copy separately from your originals in case of loss or theft.

Get Enrolled

- Sign up for the [Smart Traveler Enrollment Program](#) (STEP) to receive important information from the Embassy about safety conditions in your destination country and in case you need to be contacted in an emergency.
- Apply for Global Entry, a U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) program that allows expedited clearance for pre-approved, low-risk travelers upon arrival in the United States. At airports, instead of getting in the long customs lines, program members proceed directly to Global Entry kiosks, where they are processed rapidly and able to go directly to baggage claim and exit. Travelers must be pre-approved for the Global Entry program. All applicants undergo a rigorous background check and in-person interview before enrollment. For more information, click [HERE](#).

Get Insured

- Make sure you have health insurance whenever you are traveling abroad. All of the District health plans provide for emergency treatment. Check your health plan for the details of your coverage. If you do get treated while traveling internationally, obtain written documentation about your condition, treatment, and costs to ensure timely reimbursement.
- Consider purchasing supplemental insurance to cover medical costs and emergency evacuation. Social Security and Medicare do not provide coverage outside of the United States.
