HERE WE GO AGAIN – A NEW STRUCTURE ON THE HORIZON

Culture: The values and beliefs that shape the school district's behaviors. Through their policies and actions, school district leaders set a leadership tone that greatly influences the attitudes and behaviors of staff and students (National School Boards Association).

As LAUSD embarks on yet another “restructuring” that is not really being called a restructuring (if it is not a restructuring, then why are AALA members in local districts being required to reapply?), AALA implores the District’s leadership to recognize the veracity and model their behaviors on the statement above. Research has shown school districts showing the greatest improvements have leaders who are dynamic, involved, visible in schools, and interested in instruction. Improved districts set expectations, decentralize responsibility, support schools, and serve as change agents enabling schools to improve. Many, if not most of our members piloting the Community of Schools model will tell you the complete opposite is occurring. Our members are being bullied, intimidated, and manipulated to make the “round pilot fit into the square peg regardless”; and with no authentic feedback loop (Read last week’s *Update* for a keener perspective,) for them to express what is not working.

Districts showing promise have provided encouragement, recognition, and support and established relationships that are collaborative and reflect the needs and strengths, not only of the district, but that of individual schools and community stakeholders. We encourage LAUSD leadership to explore how important the culture of a district can be in leading improvement. We hope they recognize that “Leadership at one time meant muscle. Today it means getting along with people.” (**Indira Gandhi**). Establishing relationships that are based on trust, collegiality, and acting as a mentor instead of an enforcer is a change in culture that LAUSD leadership should certainly adopt. For instance, senior leaders have yet another opportunity to really show their willingness to support schools by:

- Establishing clear and collaborative relationships by building mutual respect and making it clear that bullying and retaliation are not values the District espouses at any level of the system
- Avoiding “shotgunning” an audience for the errors of a few
- Displaying sensitivity to the workload of school-based administrators
- Engaging community and parent leaders, while showing support for the school staff
- Developing protocols mutually as to how to best respond to complaints

- Providing instructional and operational resources when requested
- Providing needed support and guidance for new principals; acting as mentors
- Allowing “flex time” when requested

While we know reorganization does not magically lead to improvement, a key element that the new organizational structure must build is a greater sense of inclusion and social trust among the different stakeholders. Threats and intimidation may lead to intense short-term efforts but not long-term substantive improvement and may actually encourage (as we are seeing now) the departure of strong, seasoned, as well as, energetic novice administrators. As the District moves into yet another reorganization that is not a reorganization, we encourage the District’s senior leaders to take the advice of two former school district superintendents from Washington State, **Drs. Lisa Bjork and Suzanne Bond:**

- Create a trusting environment
- Establish a shared vision
- Create a collaborative culture
- Expect high expectations
- Imbed continuous improvement and support

Lastly, and to add a moment of levity, it is hard to take seriously the COSA (Community of Schools Administrator) title. The COSA acronym translates to *THING* in Spanish. Members are wondering if the Local District Superintendent’s Title will change to *COSOTA* (Real Big Thing); if the Lead Directors (an apparent position that is being conceptualized as of this writing) will be known as a *COSITA* (Little Thing) and those reporting to the *COSITA* will be known as a *COSI-TI-TI-TA* (Little Bitty Thing).

Other members are thinking a better route to take is the Dr. Seuss Model. In this manner, we will definitely know who Thing 1 is, then Thing 2, and so on and so forth. The advantage to this model, especially if you start at the Top, will help those of us in the middle to at least know which Thing is in charge, especially if Thing 1 needs a designee; and we will finally know how many Things are out there!

HEALTHCARE FAQ – 2020’S LOWEST RANKED DIETS






Last week, *Update* featured the Mediterranean Diet, the top ranked diet in five categories—overall best, healthiest, best for managing diabetes, easiest to follow, and best plant-based. This week, we look at U.S. News and World Report’s five lowest-ranked diets among the 35 assessed.

What methodology was used to assess the diets?

A fact-finding panel of 25 health experts in diet, nutrition, obesity, food psychology, diabetes, and heart disease assessed each diet in seven categories: ease of following, ability to produce short- and long-term weight loss, nutritional completeness, safety, and potential for preventing and managing diabetes and heart disease. Their findings were converted into a five-star scoring system and then ranked from one to 35.

HEALTHCARE FAQ (Cont.)

Which diets scored among the lowest-ranked *Best Diet Overall*?

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Raw Foods – This diet includes foods never heated above 118 degrees, and not processed, microwaved, irradiated, genetically engineered, or exposed to pesticides or herbicides. Juicing, sprouting, dehydrating, or blending is permitted. The diet is usually plant-based, consisting of fruits, vegetables, seeds, and nuts.
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Atkins – Low carb, ketogenic diet, mostly for weight loss. The Atkins program has three low carb plans—Atkins 20®, Atkins 40®, and Atkins 100®. Plan choice depends on how much weight you want to lose.
- 
Whole30 – This is an anti-inflammatory, elimination diet that consists of eating only meats/seafood, eggs, vegetables, fruits, natural fats, herbs, and spices for 30 days. Not allowed are sugars, grains, legumes, dairy, and alcohol. After 30 days of dieting, eliminated foods are reintroduced slowly to assess their effect.
- 
Keto – This rapid weight loss diet includes high fats, moderate proteins, and low carbs. The standard Keto diet contains 55-60% fat, 30-35% protein, and 5-10% carbs.
- 
Dukan – This weight-loss diet is a four-phase program coupled with daily walking. It starts with eating 68 high protein foods, and then adds 32 vegetables for the next phase. The third phase allows a restricted amount of previously forbidden foods, such as bread, cheese, and fruits. The fourth phase allows food from all food groups, plus three tablespoons of oat bran daily and 20 minutes of walking.

How do these diets rank in the seven categories of the 35 tested?
