THE HBC ROCKS!

The District recently published a news release highlighting the new Anthem Medicare Advantage Plan. The initiative saves \$50 million annually in healthcare costs, and reduces the other post-employment benefits obligation by \$3.8 billion. (Click [HERE](#) to read the complete news release.)

Press releases by nature cannot be comprehensive. Thus, it becomes important to provide historical context to drive home the importance of the Health Benefits Committee (HBC) to the process; and the reason why as labor partners we must always continue as a united front when it comes to healthcare.

In 1993, AALA joined forces with UTLA and the classified bargaining units to form the Health Benefits Committee. The HBC oversees healthcare and welfare for all District employees and makes annual benefit recommendations to the Board of Education. This collaborative negotiations process culminated in formal coordinated bargaining for health benefits in 2006, a milestone in union/District negotiations.

The HBC's structure:

- Comprised of bargaining units
- One vote per unit and one vote for the District
- Governing Document: Memorandum of Understanding

The HBC's role:

- Responsible for plan design changes
- Contain cost within the annual budget for healthcare and welfare
- Negotiate all health and welfare contracts

Some of the HBC's achievements over time:

- The Employee Group Waiver Plan (EGWP) leverages rebates and subsidies to reduce prescription costs. The estimated savings from fiscal years 2015-2020 is **\$148.6 million**.
- The Dependent Eligibility Audit to remove ineligible dependents and contain costs yielded a potential cost avoidance of **\$22.9 million** as of 06/01/17.
- An independent audit of the self-insured medical plan (Medical Claims Audit) verified contract compliance in calendar year 2015 yielding a total estimated savings of **\$152k**.

AALA is proud to note it was the only bargaining unit with not one but two retirees in the last round of healthcare negotiations: **Dr. Judith Perez**, Immediate AALA Past-President and **Dr. Lilian Utsumi**, AALA Consultant. Moreover, Dr. Utsumi dutifully and with distinction serves as the secretary of the HBC.

HBC (Cont.)

Before we know it, labor partners will again be in negotiations with the District for healthcare and welfare. Let us always remember the most effective “cost-saving opportunities” are NOT:

- Premium-free overage for the employee/retiree only
- Premium-free coverage for the employee/retiree and up to 1 dependent
- “Premium Sharing” whereby the District pays 80% of the premium and the employee/retiree pays a \$20% premium
- “Lowest Cost Plan” whereby the employee/retiree would pay no premium for the lowest cost plan and pay a substantial difference if any other plan is selected

Instead, the District in good faith needs to continue collaborating and supporting the HBC as the most tried, true, and tested vehicle that has genuinely produced “cost-saving opportunities” time and time again.

UNIT J CONTRACT APPROVED

The LAUSD Board of Education approved the UNIT J Tentative Agreement on April 23, 2019. At this time, no specific date has been determined for the retroactive pay that eligible members will receive. However, the District anticipates the retroactive pay will be reflected on payroll warrants in late June or July. Once the actual date has been determined, AALA will notify Unit J members.

As a point of reference, AALA certificated bargaining concluded in July of 2018; the Tentative Agreement was approved in August of 2018; and the retroactive pay was reflected on the November 2018 pay warrant.

MEASURE EE FAQs

How much will Measure EE cost homeowners?

The cost of Measure EE is based on the size of the building on a property. Owners of larger homes and businesses would pay more than owners of smaller properties. For example, the owner of a 2,000 square foot home would pay \$320 per year or a little over \$25 more per month.

Will businesses also pay for Measure EE or just homeowners?

All property owners located within LAUSD boundaries, including businesses, who are not otherwise exempt from paying property taxes would pay for Measure EE. The cost to each property owner is based on the size of the buildings on the property they own at the uniform rate of 16 cents per building square foot.

Are senior citizens eligible for an exemption from the cost of Measure EE?

Yes, homeowners 65 or older who occupy their property as their principal residence would be eligible to apply for and receive a full exemption from Measure EE. In addition, certain low-income homeowners with disabilities are eligible for an exemption.

MEASURE EE (Cont.)

What protections exist to help ensure that Measure EE funds are spent as promised?

By law, all Measure EE funds, will be kept in a separate account, must be used to support LAUSD schools, and cannot be taken away by the state or federal governments. Also, by law, funds may only be spent on the programs and services specifically identified in the language of the measure, as authorized by voters. All Measure EE funds are subject to independent oversight, annual independent audits, and public reports detailing the use of the funds.

How long will Measure EE be in place?

If approved, Measure EE will automatically expire after 12 years and cannot be extended without voter approval.

Does Measure EE address the issues raised in this year’s teachers’ strike?

Yes, a primary purpose of Measure EE is to retain and attract quality teachers to LAUSD by offering salaries that are competitive with neighboring school districts and will allow local teachers to afford to live in this high cost of living area. Measure EE would also provide funding for teachers and school support staff to have smaller, more manageable class sizes, and for students to have quality instructional programs.

Will charter schools receive money from Measure EE?

Yes, authorized nonprofit, public charter schools operating within LAUSD boundaries would receive funding from Measure EE. The District is committed to ensuring that all students attending one of its schools or a public, nonprofit charter school within the District boundaries have access to a high-quality educational program, and is committed to securing adequate funding for the ultimate goal of increasing student performance and closing the achievement gaps.

Hasn’t LAUSD previously passed similar funding measures?

No. Unlike many surrounding districts, LAUSD does not receive parcel tax funding to support school operating costs like teacher salaries, class size reductions, and instructional programs. Voters have approved local school construction and modernization bond measures in the past two decades. However, bond measures and parcel tax measures are used for different purposes. Bond measures can only fund school construction and facility upgrades and improvements—they cannot be used for teachers, instructional programs, or other operating costs. If approved, Measure EE would provide locally controlled funding for these purposes.



HEALTHCARE FAQs— WHAT’S KNOWN ABOUT THE CURRENT MEASLES OUTBREAK?

How prevalent is the current measles outbreak?

Between January 1, 2018, and May 3, 2019, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) confirmed 764 individual cases of measles throughout 23 states. Of this total, 40 measles cases have been confirmed in California as of May 1, 2019, 8 of them occurring in Southern California.

FAQs (Cont.)

Why is measles so dangerous?

Measles is a deadly infectious disease that typically strikes children and has a 40% probability of dangerous complications. It is a virus that lives in the nose and throat mucus of an infected person and spreads to others through coughing and sneezing. It remains airborne for up to two hours after coughing or sneezing. Measles is so contagious that if one person has it, up to 90% of nonimmunized people in the area will also become infected. California health officials rely on public alerts about specific locations where a person with measles has been.

Could measles ever reestablish itself in the United States?

Yes, measles could become reestablished again, especially if vaccine coverage levels drop. This typically happens when people 1) don't get vaccinated on time; 2) think they're immune when they are not (they can't locate their vaccine record); or refuse or delay vaccines for religious or personal reasons. Research shows that there is clustering of people who delay or refuse vaccines in certain communities. Outbreaks are more likely to occur when measles gets into communities with pockets of unvaccinated people.

Who is at risk for getting measles?

Most people in the United States are protected against measles through vaccination. However, the CDC reports that every year, unvaccinated travelers get measles while visiting other countries and bring it into the United States and spread measles to unvaccinated individuals. The CDC notes that two out of three unvaccinated travelers who bring measles into the country are Americans.

What is happening with the record number of outbreaks in New York City?

As of May 6, 2019, the New York City Department of Health confirmed 466 cases of measles in Brooklyn and Queens since September 2018. These cases occurred primarily among unvaccinated people in Orthodox Jewish communities and were associated with travelers who brought measles back from Israel, where a large outbreak is occurring. As a result, the Health Commissioner, in early April, ordered mandatory vaccinations of unvaccinated individuals living in specific zip codes in the city.

Can California maintain its relatively low measles outbreak count?

California is closely monitoring measles—sending out public alerts about places to avoid. UCLA and CSULA quarantined hundreds of students and staff when they learned about exposure to measles. The *Los Angeles Times* on May 6, 2019, reported two new measles cases in L.A. County and featured an article about how stricter vaccine laws actually spared California from a major measles outbreak. Since the 2014 Disneyland measles outbreak of 131 cases of measles, California has enacted legislation that disallows vaccination exemptions based on personal or religious beliefs; parents can only get an exemption if there is a medical reason not to get vaccinated. Seeking greater oversight of measles, California lawmakers are currently pushing a bill to collect the health information of schoolchildren with medical exemptions.

How do I know if I'm fully protected against measles?

The CDC considers you protected from measles if you have written documentation (records) showing at least **one** of the following:

- You received **two** doses of measles-containing vaccine, and you are a(n) —
 - school-aged child (grades K-12)

FAQs (Cont.)

- adult in a setting that poses a high risk for measles transmission, including postsecondary students, healthcare personnel, and international travelers.
- You received **one** dose of measles-containing vaccine, and you are a(n) —
 - preschool-aged child
 - adult who will not be in a high-risk setting for measles transmission.
- You have laboratory confirmation that you had measles at some point in your life.
- You have laboratory confirmation that you are immune to measles.
- You were born before 1957.

LAUSD HAS MET THE MISIS REQUIREMENT OF THE MODIFIED CONSENT DECREE

ALA thanks **Monica Nolen**, Special Assistant to the Chief Information Officer, for providing this information.

On March 4, 2019, the Office of the Independent Monitor issued the *Modified Consent Decree (MCD) Quarter 2 Report and Disengagement Update*, indicating that the District has effectively met the primary requirements for My Integrated Student Information System (MiSiS) and now has a functional and stable student information system. LAUSD has been bound by a federal mandate, the Chanda Smith Modified Consent Decree, which resulted from a 1996 class action lawsuit. The lawsuit derived from a student being programmed incorrectly, because the school didn't have critical student records.

In 2003, an independent monitor was appointed to oversee the District's implementation of 18 measurable outcomes. Among the outcomes was a commitment to build a fully integrated student information system that tracks all data connected to every student across grade levels and locations. The MCD was the catalyst for what is now MiSiS, which replaced 26 nonintegrated legacy systems. The project, comprised of multiple phases and modules, provides schools a single location to access all student records.

MISIS (Cont.)

In addition to the MiSiS project team, commendations must be paid to all District staff that participated in the development of MiSiS and District and Division leadership for their commitment and hard work on this endeavor.
